ONE MORE FOR TORONTO.

Barons Lost at the Island and On
Sunday in Buffalo.

Norfolk Had Splendid Contest and Was
Hit No Harder Than Koonan, and
That's Why the Invincibles Won on Sat-
urday—A Little Bird Tells Something
About the Eastern League Circuit for
Next Year.

Toronto and Scranton are the only teams
that did not play on Sunday and they alone
have a clean record since the standing
table last appeared.

Although tall-talented, the Barons are giv-
ing the Islanders close contests in the pre-
sent series. Saturday the home team won
with the score 7 to 4, but many think
Dan Shannon got the worst of it by two
runs on a decision that made a foul out
of a two-base hit.

The Barons went over to
Buffalo Sunday and indulged in consid-
erable hitting but the other fellows out-
ran the runs and the game. To-day the Barons
say good-bye to Toronto for the season.
Syracuse and Buffalo follow suit to-
morrow. The Eastern League circuit for
next year will be made up of three teams
and after that Providence comes along for
the last of the year.

The young man of the Providence Tele-
gram used something more than conjecture

be in the Eastern League next year. Har-
ford and Worcester would make a
great team to fill the place of the two
