Every step taken is filed with him, and a second step cannot be made till the first is established. The liquidation will move no faster than the wheels of justice." Continuing, Mr. Sutton spoke of the claims for disability, with which he is fairly swamped. Many interesting points have yet to be settled. "I make it a point," said the liquidator, "to try to adjust these disability claims, but when a reasonable adjustment cannot be made, I leave the matter-to be fought out in the courts." Mr. Sutton then read a clause from a policy, stating, "If the Board of Directors shall determine that a member is totally and permanently dissoard of Directors shall determine that a member is totally and permanently disbled, the Board of Directors, may, at their potion, on the surrender and cancellation of the policy, pay one-half its face." Now," said Mr. Sutton significantly, "there is nobody left to exercise this option, and cannot, hence these claims must fall to be ground."
