Admiral Taylor related incidents of the battle of Santiago on July 3, including the Brooklyn's famous turn. He said that none of the Spanish ships had made any efforts to ram the American vessels when they came out of the harbor of Santiago. 
MARRIAGE OF DIVORCEES.
