The Outlook for Eternity—Dr. H. M. Wharton's Last Week in Jubilee Rink.

The attendance at the evangelistic service in the Jubilee Rink last night rivaled that of previous Sundays, in number. The large building was filled to overflowing, and many were content to stand throughout the service in order to hear Rev. Dr. Wharton.

The evangelist began by saying "Now we are starting on the last week of our meetings, and I trust that those who have been attending these gatherings have had a great blessing. There are two objects which should be kept in view in connection with these services; the first is the revival and building up of those who are Christians, and second the salvation of the unsaved. I think that we might devote five or ten minutes to those who feel like praising God for blessings received during these services. If you would like to say something to the praise of God, now is your time."

Several stood up and told of the blessing which they had received during the campaign, and then some verses of "The Old-Time Religion" were sung.

Dr. Wharton exhorted all present to use every endeavor to make this, the last week of the series, the best of all the meetings. He then read a portion of the 6th chapter of Revelations.

Mr. James O. Boone, of New York, the tenor soloist, who is to sing throughout the remainder of the campaign, was then introduced to the audience by the evangelist, and sang a selection in a very pleasing manner. Before continuing the service, Rev. E. B. Lancelley made a strong appeal to the audience for a liberal offering. He also made very complimentary reference to the splendid work being done by Dr. Wharton, and said he hoped that the citizens would show their appreciation of the evangelist and his work.

DANGERS IN THE WAY

Sir John Lubbock Points Out Evils That Might Follow Adoption of Municipal Trading.

Gives Five Reasons Why Municipalities Should Not Embark in Commercial Undertakings.

Special letter to the Gazette Times. London, April 26.—Lord Avebury, better known in Canada and the United States as Sir John Lubbock, is generally regarded in England as one of its greatest authorities on everything that pertains to municipal trading. His views carry weight, because he is not only head of the great banking house of Roberts, Lubbock & Co., and chairman of the London bankers, but also has been president of about every learned association in Great Britain from the Royal Society down.

As municipal trading is one of the questions now being keenly agitated in America his views on the subject cannot fail to be of interest to American readers. I, therefore, asked him to express an opinion on the results of the recent London municipal election, in which the party that stood for municipal trading was so badly beaten. He had to say and here it is:

"Sir—I beg to say I rejoice at the result of the late municipal elections in London, being convinced that the embarking by municipalities in commercial undertakings is undesirable, mainly on five grounds:

"First, their legitimate functions and duties are already enough, if not more than enough, to tax all their energies and fill up all their time.

"Second, municipal trading has involved and will involve an immense increase in municipal debt.

"Third, it will involve municipalities in labor disputes.

"Fourth, as there will not be the same stimulus to economy and attention, will there not be a great probability, not to say certainty, that one of two things will happen; either there will be a loss, or the service will cost more?

"Fifth, it is a serious check to progress and discovery. The working classes will, of course, be the greatest sufferers.

"It is obvious that municipalities and governments cannot give the same care and thought and attention to details as private firms and companies; the service and products must, therefore, be more expensive. The national output will be less. Wages, however, in the long run are governed and determined by international competition. The government and municipal cotton mills and iron works could not raise their wages or they would ruin their markets.

"With the same, therefore, or probably with lower wages workmen would have to pay a higher price for the necessities of life. But this is not all. At present they are free. They can choose their employer and their employment. If the state or municipality is to be responsible for them, workmen would have to do as they are bid. At present, if they do not like their work or their employer, they can change. That would be impossible un-

der the new system which they will have created for themselves.

"The result to the working classes, then, would be less employment, lower wages, dearer necessities of life, and—the direct misfortune of all—the loss to a great extent of the personal freedom which they now enjoy.

In a few weeks Lord Avebury will celebrate his seventy-third birthday. The secret of Lord Avebury's wonderful achievements lies in the fact that he sets a value on every moment of his time. The extent of his own reading, as revealed by his list of the hundred books, which created so much interest a few years ago, surprised even some of his best friends, who were well acquainted with his prodigious industry. One of them asked him incredulously how many of the hundred books which he recommended to others he had read himself. The answer was that he had read them all, and that he had read them in old moments while standing on railway platforms waiting for a train.

A WIDE OPEN DOOR

Opportunities for Good Work That the Sunday School Offers

Rev. B. W. Merrill, B. A., of Toronto, general superintendent of Baptist Sunday schools in Ontario and Quebec, preached yesterday morning in Adelaide Street Church. His text was Revelations, iii, 8, and Deuteronomy, xlii, 1-6, the passage in Revelations: "Behold I have set before thee an open door and no man can shut it." The history of 150 years, the preacher said, had showed that in the Sunday school God had opened a door of opportunity that no man could shut. He pointed out the many opportunities for successful work that the Sunday school presented, and statistics were given, proving how large a proportion of conversions came through the Sunday school.

"Close observation showed that the period of adolescence—from 12 to 21—was the most fruitful in conversions. In Ontario and Quebec 82 per cent of the church membership comes from the Sunday school, which also presented a great opportunity for increasing the number of churches. The Sunday school presented a grand opportunity for the study of God's Word as a whole, and in this connection it was noted that the British and Foreign Bible Society owed its origin to the demand for Bibles created by the Sunday school. It also offered grand opportunities for character-building, making the young good stewards of God's grace and training the best Christian workers, of whom the preacher said: "Opportunity spells obligation. The parent should be at Sunday school for his own good and for the sake of his children; example and practice are better than precept; cultivate in children the spirit of giving; don't give them pennies for the collection; but set a task for them and pay them, so that they can give money that they have earned. Parents should co-operate with the teachers, and encourage them—ten words now are worth more than ten thousand will be when the teacher's ears are closed in death."

Pastor Shields preached in the evening and administered the ordinance of baptism.

JAPAN, U. S. AND FRANCE

Latter's Offer To Act as an Intermediary Not Necessary.

Washington, June 7.—While the American Government admits receiving the French tender of good offices to promote a stable understanding between the United States and Japan, the practical use to which such a tendency can be put is not regarded as apparent at the present time.

The only negotiations between the United States and Japan, which can be said to be pending or likely to be the subject of intercourse in the near future, relate to the terms of a possible immigration treaty. Nothing whatever has arisen between the two nations to preclude the most straightforward and direct dealing, while such a tendency, and consequently the point at which the offer of France could be availed of in this connection is not apparent.

From a diplomatic viewpoint the San Francisco incident is closed. The way has been pointed out whereby those Japanese who were injured, as the result of a mob attack, can recover damages from the city of San
