\$15,000 STAKES TO SALVADERE

J. R. Keene's Trio Beaten Out at Brighton—Jockey Miller's Great Work.

New York, July 26.—Before a crowd of 25,000 persons, Thomas Hitchcock, Jun.'s, chestnut gelding Salvaderone won the \$15,000 Brighton junior stakes at Brighton Beach today and defeating the 50-to-1 shot Chaseaway, with Super-Man third. J. R. Keene furnished the favorites for this race. He started his three colts, Peter Pan, Super-Man and Ballot, and coupled in the betting, they were made an odds-on choice, closing at 1 to 3. Peter Pan ran prominently for half a mile and then died away. At the lifting of the barrier, Peter Pan and Rosemont went out to make the pace, followed by Salvaderone. This order was maintained for half a mile, with Peter Pan having about a head advantage over Rosemont, while Salvaderone was third. At the five eighths pole Miller sent Salvaderone into the lead and won by three lengths.

Jockey Walter Miller rode five winners out of five mounts. After each victory he was loudly cheered and when he landed The Clown, favorite, a winner in the last race, the cheering was deafening. His mounts were all at a good price, two of them being favorites.

Contest, Miller up, and played down from 4 to 1 to 5 to 2, easily won the Seashore Handicap. Season made the pace for about a mile when Miller let Content have her head and the mare won by four lengths.

Thomas Hitchcock, Jun., scored his second victory of the day, when Hylus easily won the Brighton Steeplechase over the full course.

Delcanta, favorite, made the running for a mile and three quarters, and then Hylus galloped home a winner by ten lengths. Owen, who rode Jimmy Lane and fell at the next to the last jump, made a claim against Hylus. The stewards allowed the race to stand.

McNerney had steam, a swell drop ball and good control. He pitched splendidly and deserved better luck. And Ischy Clark was there as usual. His support was good all the way, and he was not hit in clusters until the ninth, when three clean hits scored a run, and prevented his getting a shut-out.

There were some fine fielding features. G. Arthur had a double play unassisted, and a swell one of the same was perpetrated by W. Arthur, Hosie, and G. Arthur. Bill Graham had a busy day at second base, and did most of it well. Mickey Tierney also had a pleasant day at first.

Winning Opening Game of Their Canadian Tour, Defeating Westmont 36 Shots.

Montreal, July 28.—The British bowlers won the first game of their tour by 36 shots here today in a match of 21 ends, which was concluded at 6:40 o'clock.

Two only of the visiting rinks were down at the finish. The scores were: British skips—Fingland 25, J. T. Morrison 24, J. C. Hunter 23, McLetchie 13, Telford 19, McCall 25.

The Canadians, in the same order, were: Wilson 9, Bell 15, D. Wilson 16, Brown 13, Howell 12, Mason 10. Totals: For visitors, 129; Canadians, 93.

The Westmont Club, with characteristic hospitality, entertained their numerous guests, who included scores of ladies. The weather was ideal.

The visiting players are nearly all veteran bowlers, the average age of the party being 64. Mr. Campbell, of Perth, the patriarch of the team, is 83. Mr. Pillans, of Carlisle, is the youngest, and he has reached his 32nd year. Many of them have attained what is known across the ocean as international honors, having been selected for annual competitions, owing to superior skill, among others Messrs. Telford, of Newcastle, McLaughlin, of Coleraine, Hunter and McLatchie, of Belfast. An interesting member of the team is Rattle David Wilson, of the Glasgow municipal council, who is not only an expert bowler, but a writer and poet of no small reputation in his native land. J. Butt, of Weston-Super-Mare, who will be remembered by Canadian visitors for his lavish hospitality, is another of the party. There is feeling of regret that Wales is unrepresented on the team. The Scottish element predominates, and on the Westmont green this afternoon they felt quite at home.

Andrew H. Hamilton, of Edinburgh, is secretary of the bowlers, while J. C. Hunter, of Belfast, and Jas. Telford, of Newcastle, are the vice-captains.
