The governors of western states have promulgated the closing of all churches, schools, colleges, theatres and any other public places where over twenty persons are usually assembled. Even the numbers of persons carried by electric cars is restricted.

Col. Moore expressed surprise that the authorities of London and other Canadian cities are not rigidly enforcing quarantine restrictions as a precautionary step. Many of those stricken in the United States die within 48 hours, he stated. That the disease may arise from virus disseminated by the ruthless German beasts, who would destroy the earth and all its people, is hinted at Kansas City.
