



#### **OVER 1,500 VOTERS** DISFRANCHISED FOR NOT APPEARING AT **HEARING OF APPEAL**

Many Unable To Do So in Work Hours.

UNNECESSARY TROUBLES

Great Inconvenience Caused by Present Method of Preparing Lists.

More than 1.500 London voters have been disfranchised because of their inability to appear before the court of revision which has been in session since September 2.

This fact has caused further indig-nation against the expensive and un-satisfactory way which the Government chose: for compiling the voters' lists. Only by exercising the utmost vigilance was it possible to make sure that one Only by exercising the utmost vigilance was it possible to make sure that one was permitted to exercise his lawful rights. The list compiled by the enumerators could not be regarded as complete, but had to be examined by each voter to make certain that his name had been included.

Lots of Trouble.

If the name were not entered it was necessary for him to make an appeal. This was trouble enough in itself, but in order to insure his name being recorded he had to make a personal appearance before a court of revision or make arrangements for an attorney to appear for him. According to the official figures re-

According to the official figures re-lating to the sittings of the court, given out today, it was impossible for 794 voters in wards one and two; 719 vot-ers in wards three and four, and 16 voters in the annex district, to make such an appearance, although they had appealed to have their names placed on the list.

As the sessions of the court were held during the working hours of the day it is pointed out that it was impossible for many voters to get away from work to attend.
