The caterpillar has made its appearance again in the corn field, and farmers are trying to drive them out by burning oily rags, the spraying recently done apparently having little effect on the pest.

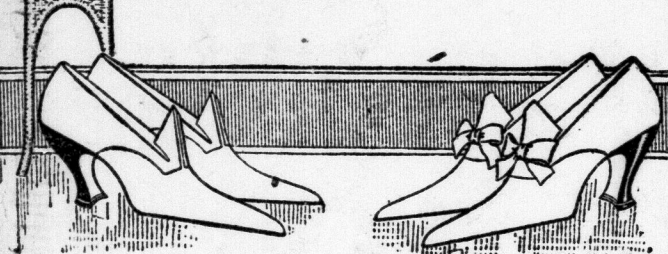
Many farmers are complaining of the ravages of crows, which they accuse of pulling out much of the corn which is beginning to come up.

ALL OFFICIALS ARE EXONERATED; SUICIDE IS JURORS' VERDICT

Better Looks On Hospital Windows Suggested At Edwards Inquest.

Grand Trunk and Westminister Hospital officials were exonerated in connection with the death of Pte. Arthur Robert Edwards, whom the jury at the inquest at the police station on Tuesday night decided came to his death on June 4 by throwing himself in front of an engine in the east end, Grand Trunk yards.

However, the jurors recommended that a more secure method of locking the windows at the institution be used.

Charles E. Glover, an attendant at the hospital, stated that he had seen Edwards at midnight, previous to the morning of the fatality. The patient was then in bed. Four hours later he had escaped by breaking the steel lock on a window.

Ernest A. Jackson, ward supervisor, stated that at 3 a.m. the young returned soldier was in bed.

William Lee, engineer of the train that struck the man, had seen him sitting by a pole on Highbury avenue. He was dressed in hospital blue. He thought, because of his dress, that he was in charge of a cattle car, and so he did not sound the alarm. He was thinking the man was familiar with the movement of trains. The train was going six miles an hour when it hit him. The emergency brakes were applied.

Marshall McLeod, yard foreman, saw Edwards sitting by the pole. James Dunn, switchman, gave Edwards a cigarette and a match. He saw him walk south on Highbury avenue to the tracks.

Coroner A. McLaren conducted the inquest.

SCHOOL NURSES IS A MATTER TO BE CONSIDERED

County Council Sends It To Committee—G. W. V. A. Asks Instruments.

At the afternoon session of the Middlesex County Council, held here on Tuesday, a special committee was appointed, on a motion by J. F. Harrison and B. Marsh, to investigate the matter of medical inspection in the county rural schools, and the need of nurses for same. The committee's report will be considered by the county council at the December sessions. The committee will be composed of J. S. Cousins, M. F. Clatworthy, James Peters and S. Shaw.

There was considerable diversity of opinion in the council regarding the appointment of rural school nurses, and much discussion was indulged in on the subject. When the educational committee brought in a report recommending that no action be taken on the matter, Councillor Shaw arose to object.

Council's Duty. "There is a great call for this work in the rural community," he said. "The urban and rural ratepayers are in sympathy with it, and demand it. It is our duty to carry out this work. M. F. Clatworthy then said: 'It is an important part of our school work. We have spent many dollars more for the small investment required.'"

"It looks like a step in the right direction," said Councillor Harrison. "The money should not be given to the Women's Institute to expend as planned. It should be given to the county council. We have spent many dollars more for the small investment required. The consensus of opinion among the members present was that there was a need of school nurses, but the school term was about to close for the summer, it was felt that there was no hurry for action, and the council will not act, according to the report of the committee appointed when it meets in December."

Band Instruments. Some of the councillors wished to give the soldiers who served in the 135th Band their instruments. A committee, composed of J. S. Cousins, M. F. Clatworthy, J. F. Harrison and County Clerk John Stuart, was appointed with power to dispose of the instruments.

The Strathroy General Hospital trustees presented a request for \$1,000 to carry over the institution for the year, and the petition was referred to the finance committee. A deputation from Westminister Township addressed the council, asking that a grant be made to a widowed mother in that district who cannot maintain a son who is a mental defective. This was referred to the committee on the destitute and insane. The body will visit the mother and present recommendations to the council this week.

Engineer's Estimates. The county engineer's estimates for 1920 were read and adopted by the meeting. These call for an expenditure of \$207,000 on county roads, of which \$117,275.25 will be raised by direct levy. Repairs to county bridges will require \$11,500, and these will be begun at once. A request from the Queen Alexandra for increases in cost of maintenance of county patients in that institution was granted.

An invitation from the East Middlesex United Farmers to attend the picnic to be staged in Queen's Park this afternoon was accepted. It was announced during the session that the council is now a member of the Ontario Municipal Association, and the warden, county clerk and J. J. Moore were appointed delegates to represent Middlesex on that body.

VETERANS OPPOSE SERVICE CHARGE OF CITY GAS COMPANY

Men Who Were Overseas Discussed Question At Meeting Last Night.

At last night's meeting of the Army and Navy Veterans a resolution introduced by Comrade Capewell, and seconded by Comrade Shaw, that the service charge of the City Gas Company be 45 cents a month, and requests the co-operation of all soldier and other bodies in an effort to have the rate moderated, carried.

It was pointed out during the meeting that the charge has to be paid unless something is done by the users of gas will be without light other than oil or candle, owing to the hydro commission being unable to extend its service at the present time.

It was alleged by one member that the new service rate was nothing but an invasion of the franchise by the company, so it could raise the price of gas without breaking its contract.

To Hold Tag Day. It was decided that a tag day be held on June 25 to raise funds for a memorial home for soldiers and sailors who are broken both in health and spirit and who need a place of rest different from that supplied by the government hospitals.

For this purpose a farm in Meadowbrook has been investigated by Professor Leach of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, and pronounced as a most desirable spot for the institution. It is located in the Niagara fruit belt and according to the reports of the professor is worth the \$75,000 which is asked for it.

The farm is located some ten minutes' ride on the electric road from the lake and half an hour from St. Catharines.

The idea, which originated with the provincial command of the association, is to give the men a home where they will be kindly treated, the surroundings of which will be congenial to their health. This cannot be found in the institutions which are under government control, and there is too much army discipline, the provincial command claims, so they are going to make an effort to raise the money for the farm.

I. O. D. E. Will Help. The Municipal Council of the I. O. D. E. has signified its willingness to help in any possible manner in conducting the tag-day to look after the veterans who according to the veterans board are beginning to suffer from the re-action of the war. It is expected that a much larger number will be found to be totally disabled in the course of the next few months.

Final arrangements were made for the carnival which is to be held in Queen's Park from June 21 to 25, and during which an automobile will be drawn for. A charge of \$1 is being made for the tickets which will be put in a glass bowl, from which Mayor

Little will draw a ticket to decide the winner. The proceeds of this competition will be turned over for the "Last Post Fund," which is for the burying of destitute soldiers of any or no organization, but who have seen service in some war fought for Great Britain. Action was also taken in regard to returned V.A.D.'s, who have been disabled, and who do not draw a pension, as they were not members of the C. E. F. or the E. F. F. These girls, while overseas, were only paid 25 cents a day, and now a great many of them are totally disabled, and the Government has refused to do anything for them on the grounds that they were not members of the C. E. F. Special notice was brought up of this by a local case. The matter will be taken up with the secretary of state to try and bring the matter to satisfactory close.

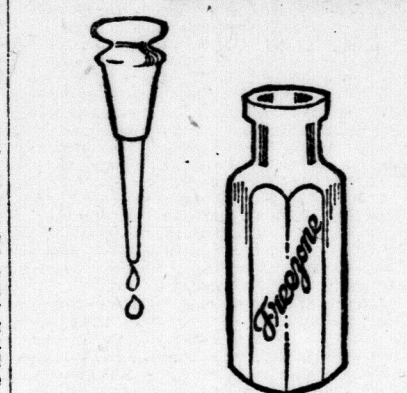
CARETAKER WANTS INCREASE IN SALARY

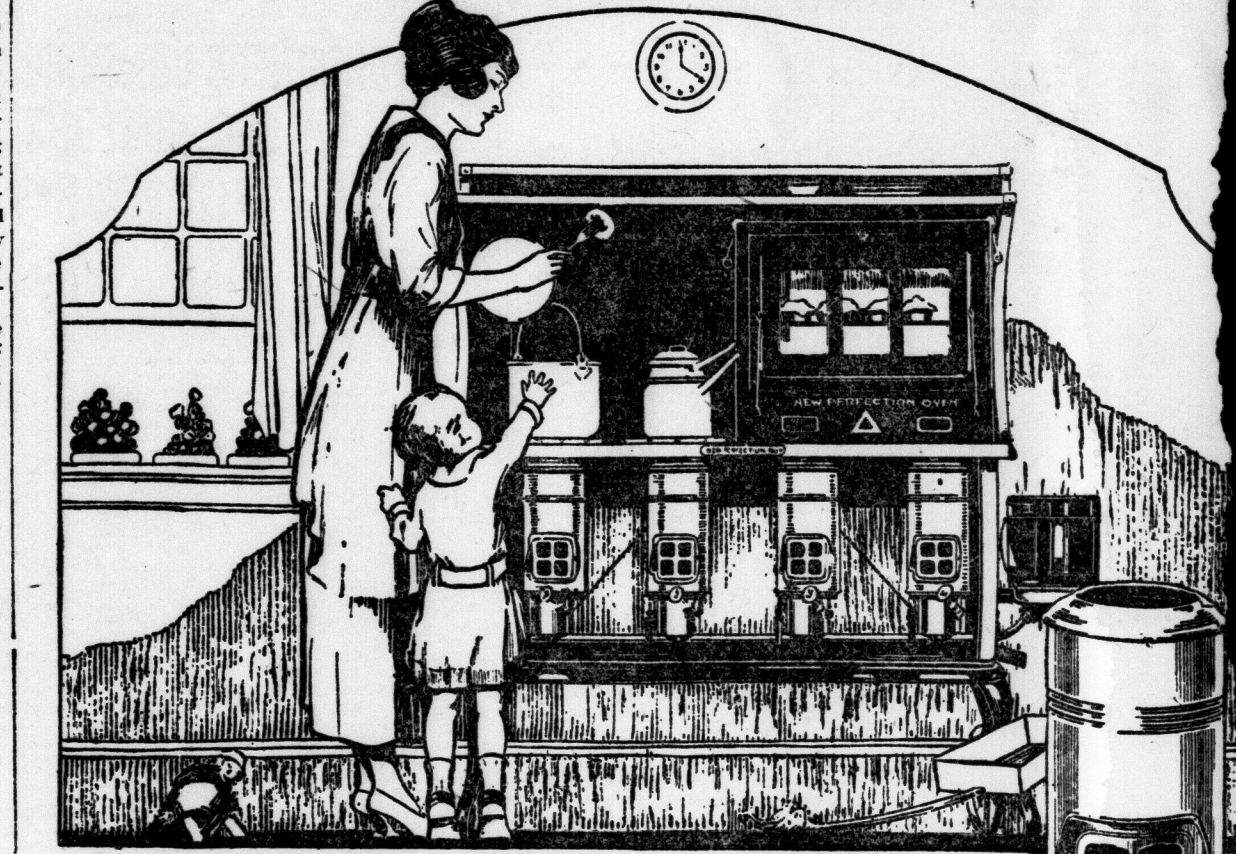

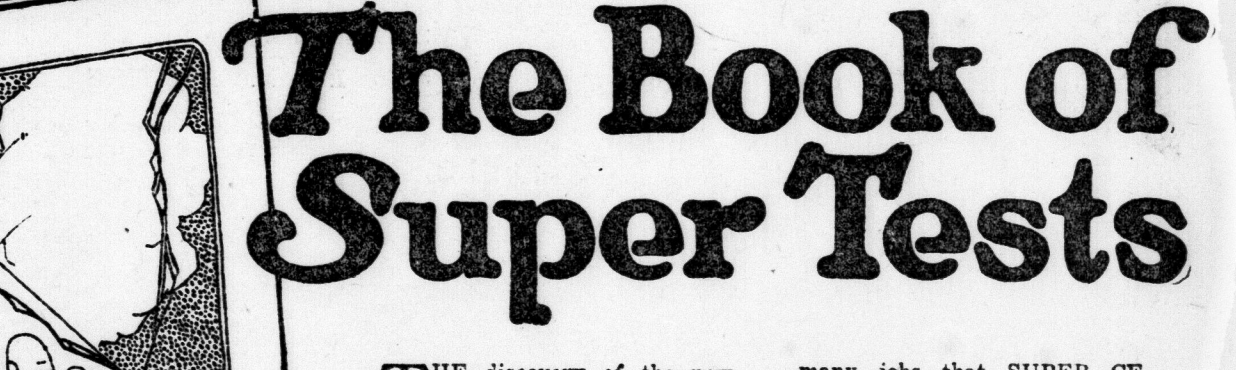
