

# FATHER FINED \$10 FOR LETTING SON DRIVE AUTOMOBILE

St. Thomas Court Aims To  
Discourage Young Motorists  
HIGH COST OF TALKING

Telephone Manager Explains

ST. THOMAS, Aug. 16.—Hitherto little attention has been given to girls and youths driving autos in the city and country roads, whether alone or under the guidance of their parents. So many complaints have been reaching the police department of the danger to other peoples' cars, as well as to the driver's own, an example was made of a lad from Fingal today, the 16-year-old son of F. P. Glover, who was fined \$10 and costs for permitting the boy to drive. Lads between seven and twelve years old, some with and others without their fathers as guides, driving cars past dangerous spots on the business thoroughfares are of daily occurrence.

Alexander M. Carlisle, standing behind the rail at the steps to the throne when the House of Lords passed the second reading of the Irish crimes bill on August 9, protested: "If you pass the bill you may kill England, not Ireland."

No reply was made to him and he left the House. Earl Curzon, a few days later, acting on the request of the House of Lords, sent a formal demand for an apology for "a serious affront to the dignity of their lordships."

To this Mr. Carlisle sent what amounted to a refusal to apologize, saying that if he had offended the King he was ready to make ample apology, but if it was solely regarded as an affront to the House of Lords "then the case is different."

# U. K. GAINS LEAD IN VESSEL CONSTRUCTION

OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—(Canadian Press).—Mr. Harrison Watson, chief Canadian trade commissioner in the United Kingdom, in a report to the Government says that owing to the interrupted increase of tonnage of merchant vessels under construction in July, the United Kingdom had almost reversed her position of a year ago in comparison with the U. S. A year ago the tonnage in the United States exceeded that under construction in the United Kingdom by 1,300,000 tons, while the surplus at the present time in favor of the United Kingdom is about 1,470,000 tons. "It seems scarcely necessary to state," says Mr. Watson in his report, "that the extraordinary increase in American ship construction which took place during the war was due to unique circumstances which have now largely passed away."
