### APPEAL JUDGE LEADS FOR THE DEATH OF THE

Writes Acting Minister of Justice That Crime Was Close to Manslaughter — Monster Petition Goes to Ottawa.

Yesterday morning T. C. Robinette, K.C., Blythe's counsel, received a letter from one of the judges of the court of appeal, who is weighing grave causes in his judicial mind, and who has ere this in judgment upon sentences of death. In this letter he says that he has written to the acting minister of justice at Ottawa, expressing the hope that Blythe's sentence may be commuted to life imprisonment. He commends that he is moved by the fact that Blythe's act comes close to the line between murder and manslaughter, and further, by the fact that he believes that the man has suffered enough in enduring the shattering of his hopes after being granted a reprieve.

Gov. Chambers said yesterday that Blythe was slightly improved, but he still keeps to his bed. The condemned man knows nothing of the effort which is being made to save his life, and believes that he has but two more days to live.

### THOUSANDS PETITION

The signatures to the petition asking for a commutation of the death sentence number thousands. Seldom has there been such a response to an invitation as in this case of the wretched man Blythe. The World letters were forwarded by The World to Hon. Charles Murphy, acting minister of justice, Ottawa, and after the mail was closed thousands more signatures were received.

### MONTREAL MURDERED BODY THROWN IN RIVER

Russian the Victim, and Tragedy Occurring 10 Days Ago Revealed By Finding of Remains.

MONTREAL, June 14.—(Special.)—Detectives are seeking the murderer of John Lavorensky, a Russian, whose body was found floating in the river opposite Dominion Park on Sunday. The body was identified at the morgue by a friend, who told the police that Lavorensky had been killed during a quarrel in a Russian boarding house on Forsythe-street ten days ago, and at night his body was carried to the river front and thrown in. To-day the autopsy revealed the fact that the man was dead before he went into the water.

### GERMANY IS ANXIOUS FOR CANADIAN TRADE
