CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL FOR EDWARD MEMORIAL

Public Meeting Decides Against a Statue—Strange Assault Case at the Kinrade Home.

HAMILTON, May 20.—(Special.)—Hamilton's tribute to the memory of the late King Edward will be the erection of a sick children's hospital to be known as the King Edward Hospital. This was decided at a public meeting held to-night for the purpose of deciding between a statue and the hospital. There was a large attendance. Rev. S. Daw, Canon Abbott, Sheriff Middleton and J. T. Laing were the principal champions of the hospital scheme, and Thomas W. Watkins, Mrs. Calder and Rev. E. J. Etherington stood for the statue. The question was put to a vote and the hospital scheme was adopted by a large majority. Rev. S. Daw in appealing for the hospital said children with broken limbs and other injuries had been compelled to leave the city hospital, because they made too much noise. Miss Jeanette Lewis, who has already raised \$500 toward a hospital, said she would be willing to have the support of a committee of public gentlemen and would be pleased to name the hospital after the dead King.

Thomas Nicholson, teamster, was seriously injured this afternoon. He was loading a piece of iron on a car at the Young-street yards when it fell from a crane. In a downpour of rain about 200 people gathered in Harvey Park this evening to see the Fourth Field Battery fire a salute with minute guns. William Stevens, engineer of the Gurney Scale Works, died to-night at his residence, 125 Steven-street aged 65 years. Miss Sarah Estess died at the city hospital, aged 84 years. She was a resident of this city for 50 years.

Labor Men Favor Hospital. The Trades and Labor Council to-night adopted resolutions favoring a sick children's hospital as a memorial to King Edward, as against the erection of a figure eight or any other amusement device dangerous to life in Dundas Park.

Rev. R. C. Cockburn of Southampton was inducted as pastor of Calvin Church to-night. Rev. A. G. Mitchell preached. Rev. W. H. Sedgwick gave the charge and Rev. S. B. Russell preached. The presbytery accepted the resignation of Rev. S. Sarkisian of Elmwood. According to Mrs. Jaxton he went home to-night with the worse for liquor and a quarrel ensued.

ARMY NURSING RESERVE Toronto is Called Upon to Join the Organization.

A Canadian corps of the Army Nursing Reserve is to be formed in Toronto. To that end a meeting has been called for May 25 in Convocation Hall at the university. This is done at the instance of H. H. Princesse, Christian, who desires that such a corps be formed in all of the Dominions across the seas. Lieutenant-Governor Gibson will preside, and Lieut.-Col. Jones, director-general at Ottawa, will deliver an address explaining this important movement. A large attendance of those interested in military affairs and in nursing is expected.

AMERICA WILL BE HAVEN FOR THE EXPELLED JEWS

Report That Expulsions From Kiev and Other Places Proceeding With Much Brutality.

NEW YORK, May 20.—Officers of the American Jewish committee said to-day that in spite of the repeated reports of the Russian Government, that the expulsion of Jews from Kiev has been postponed, the committee is in receipt of the following cablegram: "Forcible expulsions from Kiev are now taking place in the most brutal manner, and many new expulsions of those hitherto exempted are occurring. Expulsions from Moscow are also on the increase, involving additional hardships."

Concerning the effect of this action, the committee says: "As the victims of these expulsions will be driven into the already overcrowded cities of the pale or else forced to emigrate, the United States may expect a largely increased immigration of Russian Jews within the next few months, as the measures of repression concern not only Kiev and Moscow, but practically all the other cities outside the pale, in which Jews have been living, many of them for generations."

It is estimated that no less than 25,000, and probably twice that number of persons are involved, and great distress will result as the unfortunates have no other homes except those from which they are being driven.

Catholics Attended Service. At government house last night denial was given the statement in an evening paper that the Roman Catholic clergy were not given invitations to attend the memorial services in Queen's Park, and were consequently not represented. As a matter of fact the Roman Catholic clergy occupied positions within the reserved enclosure.

PRESIDENT TAFT ATTENDS A MEMORIAL SERVICE

Other Services Also Held in Washington by S. S. Delegates—Observances in New York.

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 20.—President Taft, the members of his cabinet, justices of the U.S. supreme court, the entire diplomatic corps and practically all of official Washington attended here to-day a service in memory of King Edward VII. at St. John's Episcopal Church.

The Bishop of Washington and the rector of the church, Rev. Roland C. Smith, officiated. The formal service laid down by the Episcopal Prayer Book was closely followed, with special prayers offered for the new King of Great Britain and for the late monarch, a prayer for the president of the U.S.

The services were in charge of the state department, thru which all of the invitations were issued. President Taft's military and naval aides served as ushers. The members of the diplomatic corps all were in full uniform. Memorial services were also held simultaneously at 11 a.m. in three of the city's largest churches by the 3000 or more delegates to the World's sixth Sunday School Convention. Each of the edifices was packed. Overflow meetings were organized for those who were unable to get into the main services.

At the close of the prayers and the reading of the memorial service the delegates sang the first stanza of "America" and then the first stanza of "God Save the King."

Many of the British delegates, and not a few of the delegates representing North America, were in tears.

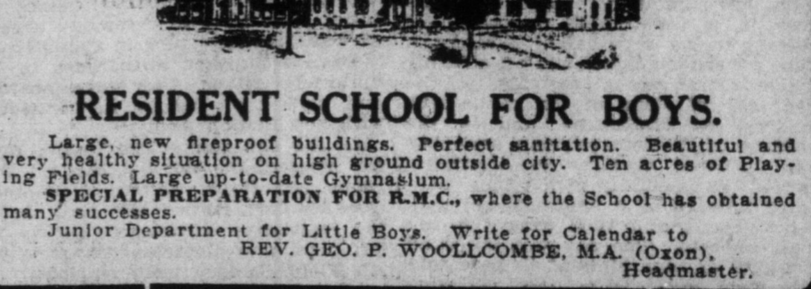
