FOURTH GAME TODAY AT CLEVELAND, OHIO

INDIANS CONFIDENT ON THEIR HOME GROUNDS

Backed by Home Rooters, Speaker's Men Expect to Turn the Tables on the Dodgers — Coveleskie Against Either Pfeffer or Mamaux Today.

Cleveland, Ohio, Oct. 8.—(Safety) camped upon their own reservation, the Cleveland Indians, winners of the American League pennant, will renew their battle for world series baseball honors here tomorrow. The Brooklyn National League team, which has been the favorite of the home crowd, is likely to find their rivals a far different proposition than the one they met twice before the attack on the Robins at Ebbets Field.

Cleveland fairly radiates confidence tonight, and the Indians cannot fail to be inspired to greater baseball play by the calm assurance of the average fan who refuses to concede further defeat for the home team. Every atom of the world series atmosphere is utterly absorbed in the first three contests in Brooklyn.

The Cleveland Club must win the game tomorrow. On the one hand, the citizen cannot help, but up to the moment the umpire calls "Play ball!" he has no charge to make. He is a citizen, not a club member. It is a community and civic matter of pride and honor. This is his duty as he is in a manner befitting the responsibilities of the occasion.

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In such an atmosphere of enthusiasm, confidence and expectancy, it is not surprising that the spirits of the badly clamed Indians should promptly revive upon their arrival here this afternoon. The Speaker and his warriors, once they felt the familiar trails under their spiked moccasins, chanted their war cry with renewed vigor and proclaimed that a Cleveland Indian never defeated until his scalp is lost.

Wilbert Robinson, the Robins' round leader, had his Indian-skin Brooklynites play for preliminary maneuvers before the Cleveland Indians this afternoon and reported no early ambush. All he would say was: "We have a winning advantage now and expect to keep it."

Close followers who have viewed the battles to date with impartial eyes express the opinion that the super-pitcher will be won and lost back on the plains of Brooklyn. It is the opinion that the two teams are so evenly matched that with a fair distribution of baseball breaks, each should win an equal number of battles here, leaving the final four games to be won in favor of the National League. Those who lean strongly to the belief that the home team will win out the Indians three games and the Robins one, which would mean that the players back to the east for the final battle. Much is expected to depend upon the manner in which the Brooklyn players react to the real world series rooting which they are to encounter with the coming games. Cleveland, rooting for her home club, is certain to stimulate the Speaker's men to greater efforts.
