**Immigration Returns For Half** of Fiscal Year Show Big Increase.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 5 (Special)—Immigration returns for six months of the fiscal year from April to September, both months included, show a total of 193,690, compared with 147,760 for the same time last year, an increase of 45,930. The ar rivals from the United States were 35,052 a decrease of 2,891, and from ocean ports 158,598, an increase of 48,824. Total per centage of increase was 31 per cent, by ocean ports 44 per cent, and from the United States a decrease of 8 per cent.
