motor boats, and plans to spend in the next three months 10,000,000 roubles on various items. The special factory maintained by the sanitary-technical department has turned out articles to the amount of 1,450,000 roubles. Up to January 1, 1916, this department expended 4,000,000 roubles on medicine. During the whole of 1915 the department distributed medicines to the value of 1,200,000 roubles; in the first four months of the present year, to the amount of 1,081,000 roubles. On July 15, 1916, the department had on hand various medical supplies valued at 2,500,000 roubles. The above figures are only some of the statistics telling eloquently the story of a great nation aroused as never before. A little more than two years ago no one, even in Russia, dreamed that such an organization could ever exist and labor in Russia. Much has been said and written about the marvelous achievements of England in the last two years. But history will marvel more at the "wonderful results" accomplished by backward and isolated Russia after receiving a staggering blow that was considered fatal by almost the entire world. The blow may have been fatal to old Russia, but quite unexpectedly to von Hindenburg and von Mackensen it had the effect of reviving and regenerating the slumbering colossus of the Russian people.

CANADIAN AVIATION BUREAU New York Receives Some Information (New York Times) Charles Seward Wilcox of Hamilton, Ont., a member of the Canadian parliament and of the Munition Board of Canada, is soon to be appointed air minister in charge of all governmental aeronautic development in the Dominion of Canada.

This information was received yesterday by Henry Woodhouse, a governor of the Aero Club of America, who recently visited Canada to study the methods used there, and which have recently been adopted by the American army and navy.

The Duke of Connaught, governor general of Canada, is one of the keenest aviation enthusiasts there. A few days ago he paid a visit to the Long Branch Aviation School, of which J. A. D. McCurdy is in charge, and there went into details of the training being done by the men training there for the Canadian Air Service.
