**MUMMERS PARADE IN AN ICY GALE**  
 Intense Cold and Thirty-Mile Wind Play Havoc With Philadelphia's Pageant—  
**"Bathing Girls" Collapse.**  
 Philadelphia, Jan. 6.—Intense cold and a thirty-mile-an-hour wind on Monday seriously interfered with the annual Mummer's parade, the New Year's spectacle peculiar to this city, holding down the crowds of spectators and sending hundreds of the 10,000 to 12,000 scantily clad marchers scurrying to cover long before the end of the route was reached.  
 Several of the marchers collapsed and were sent to hospitals to be thawed out. Two of these, dressed as "bathing girls" wearing one-piece suits, with arms, legs and shoulders bare, managed to stand the frigid blasts for nearly a half mile. Another, attired as a cupid held out for ten blocks before collapsing. The official thermometer registered thirteen degrees above zero.  
 The winds also played havoc with the handsome capes and gowns worn by the captains of the fancy dressed clubs. Several of them were ripped and torn, while the marchers were lifted from their feet as the big cloaks filled like sails.  
**Children in Line** were placed in automobiles or bundled up, and sent home. A black-face marcher, clad in a hoop skirt six feet in diameter, was blown off his feet by the force that two patrolmen who rushed out and grabbed him had to hang on like football tacklers. After they had made the "down," they tugged and pushed for several minutes before getting him started again. Some of the clubs half an hour to march from City Hall to Race Street, a distance of two blocks.  
 Hot coffee was served at several points along the three-mile route on Broad Street where the marchers temporarily rested, but its effects soon were nullified by the Arctic winds.  
 Members of comic clubs and string bands did not suffer quite so severely, although many of them were forced to drop out.  
 Despite the weather handicap, the pageant was pronounced by judges and spectators alike as one of the most gorgeous ever held here. Designs in the fancy club section were worked out with lavish hand and showed much attention to detail, while there was a marked advance in originality of conception among the comers. Several of the costumes represented months of labor and expenditure running into the thousands. In the fancy division alone the costumes were estimated to have cost more than twenty-five thousand dollars.
