In the city market this morning the following prices were quoted: Beef, 18c to 46c; veal, 20c to 35c; pork, 30c to 45c; lamb, 30c to 45c; ham and bacon, 45c; fowl, 55c; butter, 58c; eggs, 65c; new potatoes, \$1 a peck; peas and beans, \$1 a peck; cabbage, 15c each; carrots, 10c a bunch; beets, 12c a bunch; new onions, radishes, lettuce and parsley, 6c a bunch; mint, 5c a bunch; cucumbers, 15c each; turnips, 8c a bunch; celery, 10c; cauliflower, 20c and 25c each; tomatoes, 30c a pound; blackberries, 25c a box; gooseberries, 30c a box; strawberries, 20c and 25c a box.

TORONTO STREET RAILWAY FINANCES

Toronto, July 24.—All stockholders of the Toronto Railway Company have been put back into the system, with the exception of \$1,000,000, according to Manager R. J. Fleming, who appeared yesterday afternoon before a board of conciliation which is hearing the demands of the shop trades of the Toronto Railway for eighty cents an hour for machinists and sixty-five cents for helpers.

"Some years ago," Mr. Fleming said, "we gave the stockholders a bonus of \$1,000,000. That's paper, and its value will have to be determined when we come to distribute the assets."

Mr. Fleming assured the board that the company was willing to pay any increase which was just. "Other men have received increases," he said, "and I don't want these men to suffer any more than the others. He said the company was digging into the assets" to meet the obligations involved in increased wages.

POLICE COURT.

William Brennan was reported by Policeman Gibbs for keeping a disorderly house in 171 Millidge avenue and using profane and obscene language and annoying the neighborhood on July 22 at 12.30 in the morning. The defendant did not appear but his case will be brought up on Monday.

Herbert and George Taylor were charged in the police court this morning with stealing furniture from the house of James Lord, West St. John. Some evidence was taken and the case postponed. Roy A. Davidson appeared for the prosecution and Francis Kerr for the defence.

The names of four men, charged with drunkenness, were on the sheet. Three of them pleaded guilty and were remanded, while one did not appear since he was allowed out on a deposit of \$38. His case will come up later.

TRIS SPEAKER STILL IN LEAD

Has a Percentage of .414 —
Ruth Is in Fourth Place
with .392—Hornsbey Holds
Premier Honors in National
League.

Tris Speaker, manager of the Cleveland Indians, continues to lead the American League batsmen with a percentage of .414. He is closely followed by Jackson of the Chicago White Sox who is only thirteen points behind. In addition to being a phenomenal home run hitter, Babe Ruth is right in the lead, having made a total of 118 hits so far this season, out of 288 trips to the plate.

In the National League Hornsbey remains out in front with a percentage of .395, with J. Smith, a team mate, running second.

HAD DIAMONDS

WORTH \$50,000
New York, July 24.—Unset diamonds said to be worth \$50,000 were seized by customs officers here yesterday when a sailor of the steamship Stockholm attempted to smuggle them ashore. He had secreted the jewels in his clothing. The sailor said that he did not know personally who had given him the diamonds. They had been delivered to him before sailing for the United States, he asserted, by unidentified persons and he did not know to whom they were to be delivered. Because of his unsatisfactory explanation he was taken into custody by the customs officers.

HEALTH FIGURES FOR PROVINCE

June Reports of Department
Are Issued

St. John City and County
Second Highest in Mar-
riage Rate — Percentages
of Births, Marriages and
Deaths.

(Special to Times.)
Fredericton, July 24.—The department of health of New Brunswick has issued statistics for June. Fredericton again heads the three cities of the province in birth rate, marriage rate and death rate. Moncton also the greatest difference between birth rate and death rate, and also has the lowest death rate of the three.

Of the sixteen sub-districts furnishing statistics, Restigouche county has the highest birth rate, 94.3, and Sunbury county shows the lowest birth rate, 16.6; Gloucester county is second with 41.1; Madawaska county third with 36.6; Fredericton city fourth with 38 and York county a close fifth with 32.1. Fredericton, in May, had the third highest birth rate. As usual counties with a predominantly French population have the highest birth rate.

Fredericton has the highest marriage rate of the province, 28. The lowest marriage rate is 1.8 for Sunbury county. Northumberland with 5 is the next lowest. The second highest in St. John city and county, with 15. St. John city by itself has a rate slightly higher, 18.5. As before, Fredericton has the highest death rate, 16.5, accounted for by the fact that Victoria Hospital draws a large number of patients and operation cases from outside Fredericton with a resulting high percentage of deaths of non-residents. Sunbury county has the lowest death rate, 5.5. Other high death rates are St. John city and county, 15.6; Charlotte county, 10.5; Queens county, 12. The rate for the three cities of the province is as follows:

St. John—Births, 29.2; marriages, 18.9; deaths, 12.2.
Moncton—Births, 29.2; marriages, 19; deaths, 9.1.
Fredericton—Births, 33; marriages, 24; deaths, 16.5.

The rate in all cases is based upon one thousand of population per year. The rate per thousand per year for the province—Births, 26.4; marriages, 12.3; deaths, 11.8.

BAKERS TO STRIKE THIS EVENING

It was announced this morning that the masters and bakers of this city held a meeting last night to try to settle as to the contract presented by the men, but as no settlement could be made the union bakers will go out on strike at 6 o'clock tonight. It was declared that a statement in a morning paper was incorrect.

NEW SUNDAY RUNNING ON THE STREET RAILWAY
