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GERMANY THE HEROES OF REVOLUTION

Frederick To Press To Have Troops There

Three Organizations at Work and Will Likely Send Delegation to Ottawa—Government House Transferred to Dominion.

(Special to Times.) Frederick, March 12.—The city council has appointed Ald. Wilkinson, Ald. Campbell and Ald. Neill to take up the matter of urging upon the militia department the desirability of stationing some unit of the permanent forces of Canada in Frederick. The committee will confer with the board of trade and the York Commercial Club, which also are interested in the matter. Harry A. Smith, Lt.-Col. W. J. Osborne, M. P., and Mr. P. H. McLeod, M. P. It is understood that on the removal of the D. S. C. R. from this city, the old government house property in Woodstock Road will be available as barracks. Lieut.-Governor Pugsley last week signed the deed transferring the property to the Dominion. The Queen street barracks are vacant. It is the intention to suggest that the Queen street barracks be not used for troops but be put to some other use. March 29th has been set for the bye-election in King's ward. W. J. Glen, manager of the Victoria mill for Fraser & Neave, Ltd., has been asked by some friends to offer but declined. D. W. Ols has also declined.

HALIFAX 1920 ESTIMATES AND EXPENDITURES

Interesting Comparisons With Those of St. John—Sister City Gets Prohibition Fines—Has Permanent Fire Department.

The annual booklet issued by the city of Halifax summarizing the estimates and estimated expenditures for 1920, has been received by Commissioner Thomson and presents some interesting figures of comparison with our own estimated revenue and expenses, particularly in the police and fire departments. Halifax estimates her court fines and fees at \$80,000, an increase of \$10,000 over last year, while in St. John the estimate is \$8,846, an increase of \$1,600. The sister city, however, receives the full benefit of fines under the liquor license act. The amount paid to the City of Halifax by the N. S. Tramways will be \$207,000, an increase of \$6,000. St. John receives \$14,400. This amount is for street repairs and snow removal. For back licenses Halifax estimates a revenue of \$6,000, and \$1,600 from dog taxes. The police estimates at Halifax are placed at \$94,000 as compared with \$114,000 for St. John, the difference being accounted for by the fact that the St. John force is in receipt of higher salaries. The St. John fire department estimates for 1920 expenditures at \$139,000, with an additional \$8,000 for fire alarm. This is included in the St. John total. Halifax, however, has a permanent fire department. It is noted that the bills for vocational training are paid by the province.

DOCK WORKERS IN NEW YORK STRIKE

Longshoremen, Checkers and Others Go Out If All Quit, Say Shipping Men, Coastwise Business Will Be Tied Up—The Demands That the Men Make.

New York, March 12.—A strike of local longshoremen, checkers and dock workers to enforce demands for an increase in wages and adjustment of the strike call. Steamship owners said, however, that if the full membership walked out, coastwise shipping would be nearly tied up. The longshoremen are now paid sixty-five cents an hour for a fast night hour day with \$1 an hour for overtime. The checkers want an increase from \$2.25 a week to \$2.50, and a reduction of four hours a week. The dock workers want a 25 per cent increase in wages over their present scale of \$83 a week. Steamship owners declared they were unable to meet the demands because they were bound by the award of the national adjustment commission which was to remain in effect until September 30, 1920.

CAPTAIN'S WIFE HAS NO WORD OF THE T. W. H. WHITE

The Times on Friday was in communication with Mrs. Clark, wife of Captain Olive Clark who resides in St. Andrews, N. B., and she said that she had not received a letter from her husband, who was in command of the schooner T. W. H. White, since early in December. His vessel was bound from Perth Amboy to St. John with coal for R. P. & W. F. Starr, and has not been heard from since December. Some local shipping men still believe the vessel is frozen in at some port on the coast, whence it is difficult to get out news.

DEMPESEY'S WIFE SAID TO TELL A STARTLING STORY

Before being taken to the district attorney's office, Mrs. Wayne said she was ready and willing to tell anything she knew about Jack Dempsey's alleged efforts to evade the draft.

REACTIONARY FORCES, BACKED BY MILITARY POWER, CONTROL

Speculation as to Whether This Aims at Restoration of the Monarchy—Neither Hindenburg nor Ludendorff Takes Any Part Thus Far—U-Boat Advocate Prominent in it—Revolutionary Troops at Berlin.

Berlin, March 13.—The overthrow of the Ebert government was announced in a proclamation issued at ten o'clock this morning after revolting troops from the suburbs had entered Berlin and occupied the Wilhelmstrasse. Up to that hour the movement had proved a peaceful one, no disorders developing. The proclamation declared that the entire authority of the state had passed into the hands of General Provincial Director Kapp as imperial chancellor and premier of Prussia. The proclamation, issued over the signature of Imperial Chancellor Kapp, says that the mandate of the national assembly to create a constitution and conclude peace has expired, and it declares the national assembly dissolved. Berlin, March 13.—The German government has discovered a revolutionary plot organized by a reactionary clique, which also has been endeavoring to corrupt the troops. The public security forces and the Reichswehr have been ordered to barracks in readiness for emergency. Die Freiheit declares that Gen. von Lüttwitz, commander of the first Reichswehr group, is implicated in the plot. London, March 13.—A proclamation issued in Berlin this morning at ten o'clock stating the German government had ceased to exist, according to a Reuters dispatch from the German capital received here. The revolting troops entered Berlin this morning and occupied Wilhelmstrasse, the dispatch declares. No acts of violence are reported in the suburbs. Paris, March 13.—(Havas)—A military proclamation has been issued at Berlin proclaiming a new council, according to advices received here. In Hands of Director. Paris, March 13.—(Havas)—Berlin dispatches state that a proclamation issued in Berlin today declares that the government of the empire has ceased to exist and that the power has passed into the hands of Gen. Director von Lüttwitz, who becomes chancellor, and Gen. von Eberhard, who becomes minister-in-chief of the military forces. The proclamation declares the national assembly dissolved and that a new government is being formed. The dispatches add that the Socialist parties have declared a general strike. The issuance of the proclamation followed the occupation of the Wilhelmstrasse, where the government buildings are situated, by troops who had returned from the Baltic and had been in barracks at Doberitz, in the suburbs. It is said the troops entered Berlin this morning.

THE NEWS IN NEW YORK. New York, March 13.—Cables received early this morning before the announcement of the Ebert government's resignation indicate that the plot to overthrow the government was foreseen and attempted from the start. The plot, apparently without success. An Associated Press cable from Berlin early this morning reported that Gen. von Lüttwitz, commander of the first Reichswehr brigade, was summarily removed from his post by Gustave Noske, minister of defence, yesterday, and that units of military organizations in Berlin were being held in their barracks ready for instant action in order to put down the reactionary plot which has been discovered. This morning's reports state that Gen. von Lüttwitz has been appointed commander-in-chief of the military forces by Gen. Director von Kapp, who has assumed the office of premier. Official bulletins issued from Berlin last night declared the plotters had been dispersed and the Reichswehr units of the Doberitz garrison, overthrown the government. Captain Pabst, who is evidently the central figure in the new government, was mentioned in this dispatch as being among those involved in the plot. Captain Pabst was also declared to be one of the ringleaders. Both of these men were formerly identified with the brigade commanded by von Lüttwitz, and were prominent in the fighting in Berlin during the early revolutionary period. Von Kapp has been a prominent pan-German propagandist. Troops recently returned from the Baltic States are also said to have been implicated in the conspiracy. The earlier cables indicated that the conspiracy was not taken seriously by the people of Berlin, probably because the government made no effort to minimize the danger which it faced. Inquiry in official quarters by correspondents last night feared to elicit any information beyond a statement that the government was warranted, in the light of the attitude of the pan-German press to suspect a monarchist plot. The early cables stated the impression prevailed last night that the government exaggerated the critical nature of the situation. Berlin, March 13.—The government has now an emphatic protest to the peace conference and to the inter-allied commission for the plebiscite territories in upper Silesia, west Prussia and east Prussia against a series of decrees issued by the commission, which German many contends will interfere largely with the judicial organization and procedure in the districts concerned. It is also contended that the decrees contravene the stipulations of the peace treaty. London, March 13.—The troops concentrated at Doberitz, which advanced on Berlin, include the 1st and 2nd, and 4th Lower Silesian brigades. As early as five o'clock this morning, advices say, they had reached the Triergarten railway station. Washington, March 13.—Press des-

When the German treaty came up for action by the government last June, General von Lüttwitz was one of the leaders of the military party prominent in opposition to the peace terms. Before the war General von Lüttwitz had held the post of military attaché to the German embassy at London and later at Petrograd. He was born on April 9, 1868. His father, Max Freiherr von Lüttwitz, died in 1887. His mother, Irma von Gual-Gyula, is still living. There has been a strong held belief both inside and outside Germany that the pan-German monarchist party was merely hiding its time and awaiting an opportune moment to seize control of affairs. It was this belief, for one thing, that caused the Allies' worried when they considered the readiness of former Emperor William's retreat at Amerongen in Holland regarding the former ruler's personages who have been making that country their home for more than a year. Watch the Kaiser. While there has been no hint in the early reports of an overturn at Berlin to indicate that the movement looked to a restoration of the Hohenzollern dynasty, the fact that the development is apparently of a monarchist nature will cause close attention to be paid to any news from Holland regarding the former ruler's personages who have been making that country their home for more than a year. Interest in this phase of the situation is all the more strengthened by the fact that the reactionaries were possibly precipitated by the fact that a Hohenzollern prince, Count Albrecht, had been arrested and was about to be tried and possibly imprisoned in connection with the recent independent socialist against French officers at the Hotel Adlon. The despatches from Berlin yesterday's date telling of the discovery of a reactionary plot in which Lüttwitz was the very man mentioned in today's advices of the success of the plot would indicate that the government had explicit fore-knowledge of the attempt, and this fact makes an explanation of the field marshal, indeed, had only recently announced his willingness to become a candidate for the German presidency in the elections that were to be held later this year, while Berlin dispatches in January, which with the intention of becoming an active participant in the next German political campaign, had been in fact, been an effective overturn of the present government in Germany. The effects upon the relations between Germany and the Allies, and the carrying out of the terms of the peace treaty, can hardly be estimated. With a monarchist regime in control of Germany there seems little doubt that the outside pressure for the strict execution of the stipulations of the peace pact would be markedly increased, particularly from such nations as France and Belgium, with their territory contiguous to that of the former empire. It has been generally conceded, however, that the military requirements of the treaty which has rendered Germany militarily impotent for a long time to come, at least so far as any aggression on her part might be concerned. This, however, is perhaps not true of the French army leaders, among whom Marshal Foch in particular has been insistent in pressing for greater military protection against Germany for France than was provided for by the peace pact signed last June. THIS SHOCKS BERLIN. Berlin, March 13.—Berlin is much excited over a rumor that speculators, who have been generally conceded, however, to be Americans, are trying to buy the great wooden statue of Von Hindenburg into which wills were driven by the people during the war at so much as a million.
