## OFFICIAL AGENT SAYS MOONEY DID NOT GET JUSTICE

Washington, July 23.—Thomas J. Mooney did not receive full justice in his trial at San Francisco for alleged connection with the Preparedness Day bomb explosion, according to a report of John B. Denmore, former special agent of the department of justice, who investigated the case for the government. The report dated November 1, 1918, was submitted today to the house in response to a resolution.

"The plain truth is," the report said, "that there is nothing about the case to warrant the feeling of confidence that the dignity and majesty of the law have been upheld."

"There is neither anything resembling consistency in the effort being a patch-work of incongruous makeshift and often of desperate expediency."

Millionaire, Aged 86, Accuses Wife, 30 Would Have Her Former Divorce Nullified

New York, July 24.—An unusual legal proceeding was begun in the Supreme Court here when an attorney for Samuel H. Rundle, eighty-six-year-old millionaire of Danbury, Conn., whose thirty-year old wife left him a few days after their marriage, asked for a court order compelling Mrs. Rundle and her former husband, Sydney A. Toovey, to show cause why their divorce should not be set aside. Mrs. Rundle's second husband charges her and her first husband with collusion in getting the divorce, which was granted to the wife.

Supreme Court Justice McAvoy granted the order. Mrs. Toovey began her divorce suit against Toovey, and between the granting of the two decrees she continued on terms of intimacy with Toovey and "was treated by him as his wife."

**CANT GET PAINT OIL**  
(Frederick Glenier)  
Raw paint oil has become so scarce in Fredericton that painting work has been tied up in some instances and the oil painting contractors who are able to carry on work are those who had large stocks on hand.

It was said this morning that the stocks of local dealers had been depleted and in some cases crews of painters were unable to go to work today because of the lack of materials. The scarcity is said to be due to large shipments that have been made from Canada and the United States to allied countries in Europe which have been without raw oil but new shipments are reported en route here and expected within a few days.

Late quotations on raw paint oil were said this morning to be about \$2.20 per gallon, whereas in 1918, before the war affected the supply, the price was about \$1.50 a gallon.

On Aug. 28 Sydney, C. B., is to have a big celebration of the fifth anniversary of the departure of the 17th (6th) field battery for the front, the first unit from the maritime provinces accepted for war service.

## Swiss Bankers Are Growing Anxious

Fear Proposal Respecting Securities Held by Germans—Large Sums Loaned

Geneva, July 24.—Swiss bankers are expressing anxiety over the German National Assembly's proposal to require all German securities owned by Germans to be returned to Germany as large sums have been loaned by them on securities, particularly to the members of the Royal Houses of the Central Powers.

The German government's proposed law would require all German securities belonging to Germans to be re-stamped. Unless the securities should be produced they would be re-purchased. Germans during the war, it was said, deposited the securities valued at between \$4,000,000,000 and \$6,000,000,000 marks in Switzerland.

Austria, which is said to have about 1,000,000,000 crowns in securities in

Switzerland, is said to be contemplating similar action. The Hohenlohe and Hapsburg families, it is said, would, under these laws, be compelled to declare their private fortunes, which in the past have been concealed carefully.

**EPISCOPALIAN ASKED TO HELP DEMOCRATIZE LABOR**  
New York, July 23.—An appeal to Episcopals to "get behind" the movement for democratization of labor, was issued here by Rt. Rev. Dr. Charles David Williams, Bishop of Michigan, on the eve of his departure for the middle West, after a series of sermons delivered in this city.

"The democratization of industry is coming as sure as tomorrow," he declared. "We have gone through all the stages of owner and slave, lord and self, employer and employee. The next step is a co-partnership consisting of employer, employee and public—the public coming in to regulate both and see that justice is done to all and the ultimate consumer does not suffer."

Bishop Williams said he favored creation of a new political party committed to the reforms embraced in industrial democracy.




