**Cheese and Nut Salad.**  
Take some mild soft cheese, mix cream with it until the right consistency to form into soft ball. Press half an English walnut on each side. Serve on lettuce leaves.

**Steak A La Boston.**  
Place one pound tender steak in roasting pan, spread over same one half cup chopped suet, one chopped onion, hand-

ful stuffed olives which have been run through grinder, add pepper and salt and cover top with layer of tomato ketchup. Put little water in pan, bake in very hot oven twenty or thirty minutes. Delicious.

**Chestnut and Celery Salad.**  
Shell and blanch half a pound of large chestnuts, cover with boiling water, add a bit of bay leaf and one stalk of celery and boil until tender, then drain, cool and cut them into quarters. Add an equal quantity of finely sliced celery, dress with French dressing and serve on heart leaves of lettuce.

seam in material and clinging in line. This seven gored princess slip with inverted pleat at the center of the back may be developed in lawn, cotton crepe, China silk or satin.

To make it requires 2 1/2 yards of 36-inch or 3 yards of 44-inch material, with 1/4 yard of embroidery or lace 4 inches wide for the ruffle. Four yards of insertion and 3 yards of edging complete the decorative requirements.

Fold the material, if it is 36 inches or wider, and lay parts of pattern marked with triple "T" perforations on lengthwise fold and remaining pieces with line of large "O" perforations on a lengthwise thread of material.

Take the front gore, then join to this the side front. Do the same with back and side back. Close shoulder seams; then close back seam from large "O" perforation to lower edge, finish edge.

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above for opening. Form inverted pleat, crossing on spot perforations, bring folded edge to center-back seam and press. Sew collar to neck edge as notched. Close back seam of ruffle. Gather upper edge between double perforations. Adjust to position on slip, centers and lower edges even.

**CANADA IN THE WAR**

Two of the aliens sent back from Salsbury were former St. John workmen, N. Schmidt and H. Muller, both of whom were longshoremen. Each had an honorable discharge from the first Canadian contingent the only reason for their being returned to Canada being their German descent.

B. W. Wilson, a member of the staff of F. A. Dykeman & Company, was tendered a surprise party last night at the home of Miss Bessie Gallop in Victoria street, and made the recipient of a handsome silver ring by those assembled, all members of the staff of Dykeman & Company. Mr. Dykeman also presented to him a substantial check. A pleasant time was enjoyed by those present.

The alien papers are criticized—the boots worn by some of the members of the first Canadian contingent, saying that they would not be fit for active service.

Paul W. Caldwell of Greenfield, N. B., was married yesterday to Miss Jessie E. Squires of Bath, Me., prior to his going to the front with the second Canadian force.

The alien prisoners interned in Canada are to be kept at work till winter. It is likely they will be used to clear land for agricultural purposes.

J. B. Duggest, commissioner of agriculture for New Brunswick, was a visitor to the camps at Salsbury Plain yesterday.

St. John may be affected by the most recent order of the dominion government regarding bringing in live stock from in Frederickton under the patronage of Lieut.-Gov. Wood. "Pinafore" was presented in the Opera House and a large gathering attended.

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—The militia department officially confirms the death, in a railway accident in England, of Corporal James Charles Morgan, second battalion of Canadian expeditionary force.

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—An additional casualty among the Canadian soldiers at Salsbury Plain is the death of Private John Ivers, of No. 1 Stationary Hospital. He died from cerebral abscess.

**One-Armed French Soldier Shows Sublime Self-Sacrifice for Country.**

A certain English naval officer who had the misfortune to lose a leg in a shark encounter, was beset wherever he went with questioners, eager to know how, when and where he had met with his loss.

He finally invented an expedient for suppressing his tormentors. He would promise to answer them one question, but only one, on the subject. The question invariably was, "How did you lose your leg?" and the invariable answer, "It was bitten off," which, of course, left his hearers ten times more curious than ever.

A Hungarian statesman used to rid himself of tiresome visitors in much the same way by relating the following story:

Once, when in Paris, Napoleon paid a visit to a hospital for old soldiers. Among those there was an old man who had lost an arm. The Emperor asked him:

"Where did you lose your arm?"

"At Marengo, sir."

"Then, no doubt, you curse the Emperor and your country for your fate?"

"On the contrary," said the veteran, taken 80,000 Russian prisoners, while the Russians claim to have captured more than this number of Germans."

It is reported in Petrograd that General Rennenkampf, a Russian commander, has been superseded in his command because of his failure to take up a position in Poland through which the Germans were to have been hemmed in by means of a strategic scheme arranged by the Grand Duke Nicholas.
