LAMB CHOPS AND HOMINY.

Have the chops cut thick; dust with salt and pepper, and broil over a quick fire. Tie neatly on a hot platter, and put a small piece of butter on each one. Pack hominy closely in a broad pan; when cold, cut in thick slices, and serve with a heart shaped cut; fry in hot fat and serve the chops.

SCALLOPED APPLES.

This pudding is a prime favorite among the younger members of the family. To cook up finely chopped sour apples add cup of fine bread crumbs, two table-spoons sugar, a little cinnamon, grated nutmeg and a tablespoon of butter. Spread the apples upon the bottom of a buttered baking dish, then a layer of sugar and a few bits of butter. Sprinkle with bread crumbs, then apples, and so on, until all is used, crumbs being placed on top. If apples are not very acid add three tablespoons of water, over the dish and bake three-fourths of an hour, then uncover, bake fifteen minutes longer and send to table in same dish.

SHELDON CASE IS REVIVED

Curator Sues to Recover \$13,000
Drawn By a Client

MAKING A TEST

Man Got From Under Just Before Crash and Now it is Contended What He Drew Should Be Returned For Creditors as Whole

Montreal, Nov. 1.—A case of interest to all who either lost or won as a result of the operations of Charles D. Sheldon, quondam wizard of finance, will occupy the attention of the superior court during the November term, which is about to open. The action is that of Arthur Willis, curator of the Sheldon estate vs. Matthews suit being entered for \$13,000, the allegation being that this amount was withdrawn by the defendant from the Sheldon office at a time when Sheldon was in reality insolvent.

The proceedings in the case will be eagerly followed by a large number of ex-Sheldoniens, as the action is in the nature of a test case, and upon the issue in the present instance will depend what steps will be taken in regard to others who, like the defendant in the present case, are alleged to have withdrawn money from the Sheldon office, a short time prior to the disappearance of the financier. The main contention of the defence, which will be represented by Henry J. Elliott, K. C., will be to the effect that all monies entrusted to the care of the ex-wizard, were taken and received by him to all intents and purposes, for investment pure and simple. Thus, from all that investors could ascertain, the Sheldon business was over a thriving one. Statements were published at regular intervals showing huge earnings, whilst all customers had access to balance sheets, showing that the firm was carrying heavy assets.

The prosecution will endeavor to show that at the time when the money was drawn by the defendant, and for a long time previous, Sheldon was knowingly insolvent and all monies in the hands of Sheldon were illegally in his possession, having been obtained by misrepresentation; thus they could not be legally paid out to any person or persons. The plaintiff, who has been appointed curator of the estate, is acting in the name of a long list of creditors, and he has in his possession entries showing that during the last three days of the wizard's operations in the city, immense sums, involving hundreds of thousands of dollars were drawn out by hundreds who had become fearful for the safety of their investments. GAVE WINE TO HENS; RESULT, MORE EGGS

Results of Experiments Carried on By Professor of Agriculture in France

Paris, Nov. 1.—It would be giving thrice-reined gold to sing the praises of wine in France, but the experiments conducted by M. Joubert, professor of agriculture in Fontainebleau, will cause the poultry-keepers of this country to chant anew the virtues of the national beverage. M. Joubert is greatly concerned at the falling off in the production of eggs in France, especially during the winter months, and the growing importation of foreign produce.

M. Joubert set himself to remedy this condition and he seems to have been successful. Last October he selected a dozen

young hens and divided them into two indiscriminate lots of six each. Both were fed on exactly the same diet, but to the food of one half-dozen there was added a daily ration of a glass of wine each. The results were surprising. From the hens which got no wine M. Joubert had in October four eggs, in November one, and in December none and in January twenty-two.

The fowls which drank their wine daily responded nobly to the stimulant. In October they produced twenty-eight eggs, in November fifty-seven, in December forty-four and in January forty-six, so that they showed an excess of production of 148 eggs over the rest of the lot. M. Joubert does not say in his report what sort of wine he employed in his experiment. If he used the best champagne, the cost would exceed the profit; but if the stimulant was the vin ordinaire of the country, which can be bought wholesale for about three cents a quart, a new and important field of consumption for that article will be opened up.

The administration of wine is said to

have not only increased the output of eggs but also to have greatly improved their quality, a fact which will prove somewhat disconcerting to the temperance advocates.

EUROPE HAS 7,000 PEOPLE AGED 100 YEARS OR MORE

Berlin, Nov. 2.—The Imperial German Bureau of Hygiene publishes statistics of centenarians in Europe, who number in all 7,000.

Bulgaria leads with 3,883 centenarians, her two neighbors, Rumania and Servia, have 1,974 and 573 respectively. The other figures given are: Spain, 410; France, 213; Italy, 197; Austria-Hungary, 113; England, 92; Russia, 89; Germany, 70; Norway, 23; Sweden, 19; Belgium, 8; Denmark, 2.
