CANADIAN COAL THROWN OVERBOARD

Citizens of Alaska Town Make Violent Protest Against Importation

TROUBLE ONLY BEGUN

Chamber of Commerce President Heads Mob—Quiet Restored Only in Name of Nation—Another Demonstration When Next Steamer Arrives

(Canadian Press) Seattle, Wn., May 5.—Private cable advices from Cordova, Alaska, report that a mob boarded an Alaska Steamship Company vessel when it arrived with a cargo of Canadian coal and began dumping the coal overboard.

Among those who participated in the "coal party" were A. J. Adams, president of the chamber of commerce, ex-Mayor W. H. Chase, and Councilmen James Flynn and Chas. Ross.

Richard J. Barry, general agent of the Alaska S. S. Company and the Copper River Railroad, was in his office on the dock and was taken by surprise when the mob swooped down on the property.

It is believed that the trouble is not confined to the citizens of Alaska, but that it is spreading to other parts of the coast.

Mayor Lathrop has appealed to Governor Clark, who is in Washington, for assistance.
