ST. JOHN HAS REACHED ITS \$5,000,000 OBJECTIVE

City and County Won the Governor General's Flag after Remarkable Campaign that Does Credit to Committee and Citizens Alike

The local victory loan committee, with their energetic leader, Stanley R. Elkin, M. P., has passed their objective of \$5,000,000 and now the goal of their ambition is to have a crown placed on their honor flag. The grand total to date is \$5,096,550. The untiring efforts of the local campaign committee have not been in vain and they are naturally proud of the great showing already made in St. John.

The cry now goes out for the new objective. With the encouragement and backing that naturally goes with the attainment of the \$5,000,000, the canvassers will be early on their rounds this morning. They will push hard and strike often all along the line.

The soldiers overseas have won a final crushing victory, so to the silver dollar boys on this side push forward with all strength and energy and they feel sure the final goal will be reached.

The central committee has offered a splendid impetus to the "new drive." There are two days left in which this must be accomplished and they say that if the citizens will subscribe \$500,000 worth in small bonds they guarantee an equal number of large subscriptions which, all combined, will make the new objective possible. St. John wants that crown to its honor flag and the committee intend to get it.

Wednesday was St. John's biggest day of the drive, there being almost twice as many bonds sold as on any other day. Yesterday was a close second.

HON. MR. CARVELL WOULD PROCEED WITH WORK

Ottawa, Nov. 14.—With the return of Hon. Frank Carvell to Ottawa, the policy to be determined in regard to expenditure on public works will be taken up by the government. Mr. Carvell holds the view that while there should be no hesitation in proceeding with essential work, post war conditions will require an equal need for economy.

"I am as strongly opposed as ever," he said today, "to the spending of public money where it is not needed."

The development of the St. Charles river at Quebec will be considered shortly.

Other proposals in view include the deepening of the St. Lawrence channel and continuation of harbor works at St. John and on the Halifax terminals.

Peace Conference Arrangements

Paris, Nov. 14.—(By the Associated Press)—The general feeling of the associated governments is that Versailles is the most convenient place to hold the peace conference and if this were decided upon it also would serve as a recognition of the paramount position of France in the war.

In addition to these considerations, there are certain practical ones of telegraph and cable facilities and easy communication with Paris, and the ample living accommodations, as compared with those in the smaller Holland and Swiss-land cities.

Agents of the various allied countries already are seeking large houses in Paris for their delegations. The American representation will move from the small residence which Colonel House and his staff now occupy to one much larger.

Paris, Nov. 14.—(By the Associated Press)—It is probable that the first meeting of the peace conference will be on a date before December 15, after the English parliamentary elections, and at a time which will give ample opportunity for the American and other delegates to arrive. A meeting of the inter-allied conference, soon to be held, will finally determine the details of these questions.

Premier David Lloyd George and Foreign Minister Balfour of Great Britain, Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino of Italy, Premier Venizelos of Greece, and Foreign Minister Pechot of Serbia, are on their way here for a resumption of the conferences at the home of Colonel Edward M. House, special representative of the United States government.

Besides outlining the general programme, the question of meeting the food situation in Germany and Austria probably will be considered.
