## The Russian Brutus.

A TRUE STORY OF THE NIHILIST MOVE-MENT IN RUSSIA.

(From the Sunday World.) The full moon shed its mellow light over one of those mild, dreamy landscapes of Southern Russia which are so common, so uniform and yet varied in their simple beauty; a broad stream, its rippled surface glittering in the silvery rays; sleepy willows bathing their overhanging boughs in the water; the endless, undulating steppe, veiled in a dreamy mist, extending on the left bank of the river, on the right of which the ground rose in a steep slope covered with fruit trees resplendent with the white blossoms of spring. 
