WILL NOT DECIDE THE INTERNATIONAL TROPHY

Olympic Committee Finds Trouble In Fairly Judging the Various Contests Now In Progress

LONDON, July 17.—The British Olympic Association has concluded not to decide the championship of the nations competing in the Olympic games held in London this year, and the same decision applies to the sports now going on at the stadium at Shepherd's Bush. The original idea was to offer a trophy for the country securing the most points in all games, those held in the stadium and those played at various clubs, such as the tennis at Queen's Club and the rifle matches at Hales, but the difficulty of arriving at an equitable method of allotting the points was so great that the idea has been dropped.

The committee worked out several schemes, but each was open to so many objections on account of unfairness to one nation or another and the attempt to reach a fair basis having been found impossible, the British Olympic Association had to decide reluctantly not to offer trophies of any kind excepting the gold, silver and bronze medals in each competition. Captain W. Jones, Assistant Secretary of the Association, gave out this information, which has not yet been announced here.

Captain Jones concluded his statement as follows: "The newspapers of the different countries will be able to decide the matter for themselves. America, probably more than any other nation, would have cause for complaint if it was decided to offer a trophy. The distance to the United States is great and the Americans were not expected to win many medals at the United Kingdom. In some events, such as polo, shooting and lawn tennis, America is not represented. Therefore, if points were awarded for every event, the United Kingdom would have a 'walkover'."

"The Americans competing in the stadium games are simply going in for the championships in the field events and are counting their points by the American method, five for first, three for second, and one for third. There are only three events on this morning: individual sabre competition, and two archery contests. The first of the archery contests was the York round for gentlemen, and the second, the National round for ladies. By the time the games opened this afternoon, the weather had cleared somewhat and there was a better attendance. Several events were contested at the same time and on the whole the scene was more animated than on any previous day. The part of the arena reserved for field events was in use as was the fencing grounds adjoining the stadium. The men who had qualified for the final in the ten mile walk, all of them members of the United Kingdom team, with the exception of H. B. Kerr, Australia, were on the cinder path and in the centre of the arena were the javelin throwing competing in the contest with the javelin held in the middle. In another portion of the arena, the big men of Greece, Germany, Sweden, United States and the United Kingdom, the last named having three teams entered, had congregated for the tug of war. The first heat of the semi-finals of the 100 metre back-stroke swimming contest was won by Hildebrandt, Germany, in one minute, 25.3 seconds. Dane, Denmark, was second. In the second heat, Hildebrandt, United Kingdom, was first, and Aurick, Germany, second. The winner's time was one minute 25.1 seconds. The final in the ten

W. S. FISHERMEN IN THE GOULD DIVORCE SUIT

They Have Been Kept Hidden for a Week Case Will Come to Trial in a Few Weeks.

NEW YORK, July 17.—Contrary to the rumor that Mrs. Frank J. Gould has been reconciled to her husband and that their differences had been amicably settled, Mrs. Gould's suit for divorce is on the motion calendar at the supreme court today, and it is expected that it will be brought to trial within the next few weeks. All of the efforts of friends of the young couple to bring about a settlement of their marital difficulties without resort to the divorce court are said to have failed. For several weeks it is said that both Mr. and Mrs. Gould have had detectives at work getting evidence for the coming trial. It is alleged that Mrs. Gould has had brought down from Nova Scotia two defendants who are ready to testify as to certain things alleged to have happened on a sailing trip taken by Mr. Gould to Nova Scotia during the summer of 1906. These men, it is said, were at court last week, but Mrs. Gould's attorneys found on that date some defect in the papers and an adjournment was obtained until today. In the meantime it is reported it was deemed advisable to smuggle the Nova Scotians out of the city as quietly as they were brought in. Accordingly a pair were taken to a little out of the way village on the north shore of Long Island. There, with their identity carefully concealed they have been staying for the last week.

CAME FOR BROTHER'S BODY.

This morning early an uncle and three brothers of Ruben W. Greenwood, who dropped dead on Fitch Wm. Street yesterday, arrived at Reed's Point. They left Wilson's Beach, Campbell, last evening on a relic quest. They were all night making the trip here in a gasoline boat. Arriving here they called on Chief Clarke, who detailed Policeman Belyea to conduct them to Undertaker Chamberlain's room, where the body was.

One of the brothers, the deceased was 21 years of age and had been in Vancouver since last fall where he went with three other young men from Campbell. The deceased, he said, was always looked on as being a healthy young person, having never complained of being ill. He left Vancouver last Saturday, and the news of his death was a great shock to his family. The remains were taken charge of relatives and at 9 o'clock this afternoon were conveyed to Reed's Point and placed on board the launch. The party left shortly after Mr. Wilson's Beach where the interment will take place.

MAY ERECT ARMORY ON BARRACK GREEN

If this plan is carried out it will prevent the exhibition association from ever arranging a race track anywhere near the exhibition grounds.

CLEVELAND, O., July 17.—The Farmers and Merchants Banking Company at 287 West 26th Street closed its doors today. The liabilities and assets are each estimated to be about \$800. The failure is said to have been due to the inability of the bank to realize upon loans.
