WILL NOT BE BUMPER CROP
BADDECK NO. 1 TO FLY TODAY

WINNIPEG, Aug. 9.—All the West is throbbing with interest just now over the condition of grain. It is a source of general conversation, for every line of business between the Lakes and Mountains depends to very considerable extent upon the grain crop of the prairie provinces. The yield will not be a bumper crop. This statement in times past has been regarded in the prairie section as the highest form of disloyalty, but now blood in the West is modifying many ideas and this is one of them. Farmers have suffered from crop boomers, as have business men generally almost every year, and the crop boomer, the man who knows that the yield is to be enormously increased, etc., is becoming unpopular. He is being put up into the same basket with the man who insists that while Manitoba produces the best No. 1 hard wheat in the world, it never gets sadder in winter than a mild frosty morning. Crop conditions throughout the West are good, very good, and business as a result is out of all proportion to facilities and equipment, but the yield will in no event exceed an average crop, and it may be slightly under last year's. This condition is due entirely to lack of early moisture in many districts, but in others, and excessive moisture late in the season elsewhere.

CANADIAN NEWS TOLD IN BRIEF PARAGRAPHS

TORONTO, Aug. 9.—Morris Jackson, employed by the firm of Stewart, Howe and Meek, was terribly injured this afternoon by a fall of six stories down the elevator shaft on their building. Just how the accident occurred is not known.

PORT WILIAM, Ont., Aug. 9.—Five hundred freight handlers employed in the C. P. R. sheds at Port William, are on strike. They demand an increase from 17 1/2 cents an hour for day, and 22 cents for night, to 22 cents and 25 cents.

The Assemblies of the C. P. R. line arrived this morning from Owen Sound with a large load of packages. Freight and express cars were being loaded by checkers and crew in time to leave tomorrow afternoon on their regular time. The attention of being made to unload other freight boats.

OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—The way the veterans' land grants have been taken up to the belief that not many are left to be certified to by the department of militia.

Up to July 21 warrants located by volunteers totaled 251, by substitutes 1,094, certificates issued by the militia department numbered 6,373 and warrants issued by the interior department were 6,139.

While about 8,000 Canadians went to South Africa at different times a large number were men who served twice. This was especially noticeable in the last contingent. A little over 2,000 warrants are off the market for good, 281 being located by volunteers and 1,711 registered by substitutes. Between the decreasing number for sale and the advance in the price of C. P. R. lands \$5 per acre there ought to be a rise in prices in the near future.

CANNO, N. S., Aug. 9.—A drowning accident occurred about 4 o'clock this afternoon, when Philip Lumsden, three year old son of James A. Lumsden, was drowned, by falling overboard from his father's wharf, while watching some children bathing nearby. Lumsden was working at his fishing gear only a few yards away, and immediately rushed to his rescue. Although the child was in the water only a few minutes life was extinct.

OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—The mounted police have just completed a task which brings back memories of the days when Canada was engaged in the Northwest rebellion. Two men were

killed by the Cree near Frog Lake, Alberta, in April, 1885. They were buried where they fell, two of them in the cellar of their house in which they were murdered and buried. In 1885 the bodies of two of the victims, who were Roman Catholic priests, were removed, the other eight remaining undisturbed until this summer, when their bones were taken from the neglected graves scattered over a half mile of country. DALHOUSIE, Aug. 9.—John Diette, of Dalmon, Redoubt county, at tempted to commit suicide. He tried to cut his throat with a razor, but was foiled in the attempt, and now lies in a precarious condition. Diette has been insane for some time but was not considered dangerous.

GIRL IS KIDNAPPED IN PITTSBURG STREET

Middle-Aged Woman Aids Two Men in Early Morning Abduction

PITTSBURG, Aug. 9.—What is believed to have been one of the boldest acts of kidnapping ever performed in this city occurred at about two o'clock this morning in Seventh avenue, between Liberty avenue and Smithfield street. It was witnessed by a young man who did not realize the seriousness of the situation until after he had heard a muffled scream and saw a cab hurried away up the avenue toward Grant street with a young girl he had observed only a moment before walking away from the Union station with a middle-aged woman.

The girl appeared to be about 18 years old. She was pretty and stylishly dressed in a blue costume and hat of a lighter color, trimmed with red. The other woman was dressed in black and had the appearance of being 35 years of age. When they reached Seventh avenue, the girl was waiting, and the woman, a middle-aged woman, was waiting.

SUES FOR A DIVORCE; SAYS WIFE LEFT HIM

Husband's Brother Occupies \$14,000 Home Built for Bride

BERTON, Md., Aug. 7.—Alleging abandonment on the part of his wife, who was Miss Clara V. Thompson, of West Philadelphia, Chas. E. Warburton, of this city, has instituted an action for divorce. The pair were married five years ago and made their home here after an extensive wedding tour. The Thompsons lived in Chestertown, Kent county, and the love affair of the young people was of long standing. Mr. Warburton built a \$14,000 residence here, and while it was being constructed the bride made her home with the husband's family.

Several weeks after the pair took possession of their handsome home, Mrs. Warburton suddenly departed for West Philadelphia, where her husband's counsel says she still resides, and that she refuses to return to her husband. The house is now occupied by Henry A. Warburton, brother of the plaintiff.

The marriage took place in February, 1904, and it is alleged that she left her husband in August, 1905. Under an order of the Circuit Court Mrs. Warburton will be required to appear in the court on or before September 22 next to show cause why the divorce should not be granted. It is understood that Mrs. Warburton has engaged Omar D. Crothers, a nephew of Governor Crothers, as counsel, and that she will fight against a divorce.
