Saturday Sermonette

THE MASSACRE OF THE INNOCENTS

If you go into the country these days be careful how you go through a strip of woods, and if you are going into the wilderness, get insured as largely as you can for the benefit of your wife, mother or mother-in-law and say your prayers before you go, for the chances are you will not come out alive.

Go where you will you will hear the sound of a gun, every day of the week, Sunday not excepted.

If the guns were always in the hands of careful responsible men it would not be so dangerous, but when the twin idiot of the man "who rocks the boat" is out of the asylum with a gun and shoots you because he thinks you are a moose, or points the gun at you that is not loaded, you had better make your will and "git relig'us" before you leave home.

If game licences were only given, for a few years, to the kind of imbeciles I have mentioned they would kill each other off and then we could go into the wilderness and feel comparatively safe.

Now, mothers and wives see their sons and husbands go away to the woods with as many fears as if they were going to the wars.

Some of the innocents who will be massacred this "Open Season" will be a few (all too many) of the men who will go to massacre those more innocent than themselves.

Much of the killing in the wilderness is innocent, and it is God meant it. But much of the killing is not innocent, for God never meant that harmless inhabitants of the wild woods should be wantonly destroyed to feed his cruelty or minister to his vanity.

Many a squirrel and many a bird will be shot by disappointed, incompetent hunters who will show that it was not poor marksmanship that was sending them out of the woods without the moose they went for.

The "head" that will not be shown with much pride, for it is an indifferent head, when secured at the expense of leaving the "carcase in the wilderness" is not very thoughtful, intelligent hunting; for the considerate hunter even with the rifle instinctively going to his shoulder as he gets within rifle distance of his quarry will—when he sees that the lordly moose that he thought he was hunting is only "a little one"—say "let him go and grow" if not for me for some other fellow.

We all felt badly, when we read the other day that a cow moose and her two calves were run down by a train and killed, and we all gave the driver the benefit of the doubt. It was unavoidable, "they were going around a curve and saw them too late to stop the train," or they would not be "shooed" from the track.

But many an innocent will be massacred by thoughtless hunters who, to try the new rifle, or to show their skill or to practise, will destroy a beautiful bird and still its joyous song forever.

Looking to the Future

Once a good many years ago, I heard a certain public man, a politician, giving his son a sort of lecture. It seemed that the young man had felt himself slighted, and had retaliated in a way that seemed very clever to himself, but must surely have been most exasperating to the party of the second part.

"You just cant afford a thing like that," said the father. "Better swallow any slight that is short of actual insult and think well before you decide anything to be an insult—laugh it off, act any way, but never make an enemy. You will be in public life some day, and you never know when an occasion will rise that will make that man very necessary to your plans. Look to the future—make friends that you will be able to use by and by, and no man or woman is too unimportant to be considered."

I turned away, a little sick at heart the counsel seemed so selfish, so worldly-wise, but I have long since come to recognize the real value that underlies it. We cannot afford to overlook what the future may bring, for we never know when we will need the very individual who seems so hateful, so contemptible for the moment; not in a slight that the old judge meant, but in a broader, better one. The occasion may arise when we may help that one—may reach out a hand to lift him up, and the soft answer, or no answer at all, will never be in the way, while the memory of recrimination and retaliation on our part, will create doubt of motives and a certain mistrust that will nullify the best and purest intentions.
