Strict Enforcement. Immigration laws at this port are being enforced more strictly than heretofore. Before a captain can secure clearance he must furnish a list containing details of every member of his crew. The following notice has appeared in the clearance office of the Customs House: "Collectors at coast ports are instructed to grant a clearance to any vessel arriving in Canada from or departing for any port in the Dominion of Canada until the immigration agent or officer in charge certifies that the master of the vessel has complied with the provisions of the immigration act."

Humidity on the Coast.

The Vancouver World reports a statement by an ex-attorney-general of the province to the effect that the local government liquor store in one month took in for sales the sum of \$155,000. The World adds that on such a basis the liquor bill of British Columbia for the year 1919-20 is estimated to be over \$1,700,000 in a year's time. This is about one-sixth of what the liquor bill of the province is supposed to have been under license and although the reduction is noteworthy, it still amounts to figures that are discouraging. Who inherited this fifteenth century wardrobe?

NOTICE

The Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities have ordered that the supply of natural gas by the Moncton Tramways, Electricity and Gas Company, Limited, to consumers and the consumption of such gas shall be subject to the following rules and directions:

(1) That the use of natural gas under boilers and for operating or illuminating signs and advertisements is prohibited. (2) That the consumption of natural gas for power purposes in all factories and manufacturing establishments which had an average monthly consumption of five hundred cubic feet per month and upwards during the preceding twelve months are hereby limited during the coming winter to the consumption of four hundred cubic feet per month and upwards during the corresponding winter months of A. D. 1918 and 1919. PROVIDED, HOWEVER, AND IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT IN NO CASE shall such consumption exceed three million cubic feet in any one month.

(3) That the consumption of natural gas for power purposes in the Canadian National Railway shops and in all factories and manufacturing establishments which had an average monthly consumption of five hundred cubic feet per month, and not exceeding four million cubic feet per month, during the preceding twelve months, are hereby limited during the coming winter months to the consumption of four million cubic feet per month, and not exceeding five million cubic feet in any one month. PROVIDED, HOWEVER, AND IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT IN NO CASE shall such consumption exceed five million cubic feet in any one month.

(4) That all factories and manufacturing establishments which had an average monthly consumption of less than five hundred thousand cubic feet per month during the preceding twelve months are hereby limited to a consumption not exceeding their consumption during the corresponding winter months of A. D. 1918 and 1919. PROVIDED, HOWEVER, AND IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT IN NO CASE shall such consumption exceed five hundred thousand cubic feet in any one month.

(5) That in all bakeries and bake shops consuming less than two hundred and fifty thousand cubic feet per month the use and consumption of natural gas may continue as heretofore, provided that such consumption shall not exceed two hundred and fifty thousand cubic feet in any bakery or bake shop in any one month. (6) That the use of natural gas is prohibited in churches and schools and in theatres and other places of amusement.

The foregoing rules shall not apply to the use of natural gas for lighting purposes. The Moncton Tramways, Electricity & Gas Company, Limited, is hereby directed to supply natural gas only in accordance with the rules of this order. The foregoing rules shall come into force and take effect on the 15th day of November instant, (except as to schools and churches, to which class of consumers they shall be effective in one month from the date of this order), and shall continue in force until further order of the Board; AND IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that the Moncton Tramways, Electricity & Gas Company, Limited, do give immediate public notice of the foregoing rules and provisions of this order.

This Board hereby retains jurisdiction over the subject matter of the application, and reserves the right, at any time hereafter to add to, amend or alter all or any of the foregoing rules, and to suspend the operation of the said rules or any of them, and to continue the operation of the said rules or any of them beyond the period named in said rules, of its own motion upon reasonable notice to all others interested. Notice is hereby given that further consideration of this matter will be had by the Board on the fourth Wednesday in November instant.
