Miss Margaret and Missie Baby and their sister, Mrs. Madeline, have arrived from Dorchester and will spend several weeks in town.

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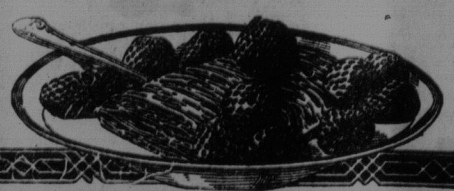
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## Grand Bay
