## RESOLUTION AT THE CONFERENCE

Town Planners Met At Hamilton.  
NUMBER LESS THAN USUAL.

The town planning conference at  
Hamilton held its first business  
session yesterday morning. The re-  
port of the resolutions committee  
was presented. The conference ap-  
proved of a resolution from Barton  
and municipal not to be so amend-  
ed that rural municipalities will  
have the same jurisdiction over  
the opening and regulation of gravel  
pits as cities have.

**Mansard Roofs.**  
The Women's Independent Labor  
party of Hamilton asked the con-  
ference to endorse a resolution re-  
questing a change in the civic by-  
laws whereby plans of apartment  
houses with mansard roofs should  
be first passed on by the board  
of health before a permit for such  
building is issued. The conference  
approved.

**To Study Citizenship.**  
The resolutions committee pre-  
sented a resolution calling upon the  
provincial department of education  
to make "citizenship" a compulsory  
subject in public, separate and high  
schools, and create faculties of gov-  
ernment and citizenship in the uni-  
versities.

Several members objected to the  
resolution on the ground that it  
was not germane to the subject  
of town planning. Chairman Main  
defended the resolution. After the  
resolution had been put to a stand-  
ing vote and carried, F. Macleure  
Slanders, secretary of the Windsor  
chamber of commerce, heatedly pro-  
tested.

"That resolution has altogether  
too wide a scope for this confer-  
ence. We're wandering all over the  
map. We came here to discuss  
town planning, but it's very little  
talk of town planning I've heard  
since I've been here."

Another resolution passed called  
upon the fire chiefs of every munici-  
pality to lecture to the school  
pupils on fire prevention.

**Municipal Accounting.**  
A resolution calling upon the  
government to standardize the sys-

tem of municipal accounting again  
aroused the ire of the Windsor  
candidate, Mr. Slanders, who moved  
in amendment that the resolution  
had nothing to do with the confer-  
ence. On a standing vote the amend-  
ment carried, whereat Chairman Main  
expressed regret.

**Smoke Nuisance.**  
Another resolution called upon  
cities to prevent factories locating  
to the windward of the city, in  
which case the prevailing winds  
would blow the smoke and fumes  
over the city. J. McAdams, con-  
vener of the resolutions committee  
remarked that smoke consumers  
helped some, but did not solve the  
smoke nuisance question.

The resolution finally carried and  
will be forwarded to all munici-  
palities in southern Ontario.

**Cheaper Houses.**  
A resolution from the London  
trades and labor council request-  
ing cheaper houses and easier buy-  
ing terms for workmen was for-  
warded to the federal government  
and provincial housing commission  
for sympathetic consideration, but  
not until after an argument some  
delegates taking the stand that it  
looked like a suggestion to the  
housing commission to put up shacks.

**Beauty and Health.**  
Mrs. Dr. S. Lyle, president of  
the local Council of Women of  
Hamilton spoke on "Beauty and  
Health in Town Planning."

**Industrial Development.**  
"Town Planning in Relation to  
Industrial Development" was the  
subject of an informative address  
by C. W. Kirkpatrick, industrial  
commissioner of Hamilton.

**Noon Luncheon.**  
The Hamilton board of trade  
tendered the noonday luncheon to  
the delegates of the town planning  
conference. W. J. Donald, secretary  
of the Niagara Falls chamber of  
commerce was the principal speaker.

"Zoning" was the topic of his address.

**OUTLETS FOR RAILWAYS**

**Ferry Accommodation at Sarnia to be Improved as Part of National System**

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—The Canadian National Railway System, when the Grand Trunk is merged with it, will use all the available Ontario outlets to the United States and not centralize on one route as has been suggested in some quarters.

One channel of traffic will be by way of Black Rock and Buffalo, another by the Sarnia tunnel to Port Huron, and a third to Detroit via Windsor. The ferry communication between the two last mentioned cities will be improved. In Quebec the outlet to the States will be at Island Pond on the Vermont border.

The Grand Trunk agreement will be considered by the Cabinet next week or as soon as Hon. Dr. Reid is able to be back. He has been laid up at his home in Prescott with congestion of the lungs, and narrowly escaped pneumonia, but is now convalescent.

**LABOR CONFERENCE ENDS**

**Final Session Dealt With Women Wage Earners**

Washington, Nov. 29.—After a month's continuous session the first International Labor Conference adjourned at 2 p. m. today to meet again subject to the call of the governing body. The delegates from more than a score of countries immediately began preparations for their departure for home.

Women wage earners, including those engaged in commerce, as well as in industries, are to be indemnified for

time lost during child birth under a convention adopted today by the conference, for submission to the various Governments for approval.

The convention as originally drafted was amended so that reimbursements would be paid by the state or "by means of a system of insurance."

The Irish College of Gardening for the training of women gardeners has been opened in one of the suburbs of Dublin.
