The windows were reported all right at 4:30 when the patrolman passed on his beat but were broken when he came by again about 5:45. The work was very clumsily done, and the police of the opinion that it was the work of an amateur possibly a young man or a boy.

## Library Board Were Guests.

Last evening the members of the Public Library Board were the guests of Mr. J. J. A. Weir who also is a member of the board. A pleasant evening was spent. There were present Chairman P. Fisher, Rev. Father Zinger, Mr. W. J. Motz, Mr. W. H. Breithaupt, Mr. D. Forsyth and the Librarian, Miss Dunham.

The business transacted at the meeting was principally routine. Among the matters decided on was to call for applications for a librarian in the children's department. One with teaching experience is preferred. Mr. Weir also gave notice of motion that he would at the next meeting bring in a bylaw to amend the present bylaw governing the loaning of books to readers. It is proposed to do away with the requirement that persons in the city who are not property owners must have a guarantor when making application to secure the privilege of borrowing books. The librarian thinks that it is not necessary to continue the present method.
