

may be given made or pronounced in such suit or action, may be of peculiar importance, or may affect, directly or indirectly, the decision of any other question or questions of peculiar importance, or involve directly or indirectly, any claim demand or question, to or respecting property, or any civil right amounting to or of the value of sterling; and if after giving or pronouncing such judgment decree or order, the said Judge shall be of opinion that such judgment decree or order is of peculiar importance, or involves directly or indirectly, any claim demand or question as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the said Judge to permit either of the said parties, plaintiff or defendant, to appeal to the Supreme Court in like manner, and under and subject to the like rules and regulations as in and by this Act directed; Provided always, That upon any appeal whatever to be brought to the said Supreme Court, from any judgment of either of the said District Courts, founded upon the verdict of a Jury, the said Supreme Court shall not reverse alter or inquire into the said judgment, except only for error of law, apparent upon the proceedings.

Appeals from the Supreme Court to His Majesty in Council to be regulated by Charter.

And be it further Enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by the said charter or letters patent, to allow any person or persons, feeling aggrieved by any judgment, decree, order or sentence of the said Supreme Court, to appeal therefrom, to His Majesty in Council, in such manner, within such time, and under and subject to such rules regulations and limitations, as His Majesty, by such charter or letters patent respectively, shall appoint and direct.

Judges of the said Courts may authorize proper persons to do certain ministerial acts.

And be it further Enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the said Chief Justice and Judges respectively, by commission or warrant in writing under the hand and seal of such Judges respectively, to authorize and empower fit and proper persons to issue process, take bail, administer oaths, and take depositions, and to do and perform all such other necessary acts appertaining to the said courts respectively, as the said Chief Justice and Judges respectively from the local circumstances of the said colony shall or may not be able to perform in person, saving and excepting the enquiring of, hearing or determining of any crime or misdemeanor, or the holding plea of any action suit or matter whatsoever.

Judges may permit suits pending before them to be removed to another Court, in which such suits may be more conveniently tried.

And be it further Enacted, That as often as any action or suit shall be brought in the said courts respectively, and it shall be made to appear to the Chief Justice, or respective Judge before whom such action or writ may be pending, that such action or suit may be more conveniently heard and determined in some other of the said courts, it shall be lawful for such Chief Justice or Judge to permit and allow such action or suit to be removed to such other court; and such allowance shall be certified by such Chief Justice or Judge, together with the writ or process and proceedings in such action or suit, to the court into which such action or suit shall
