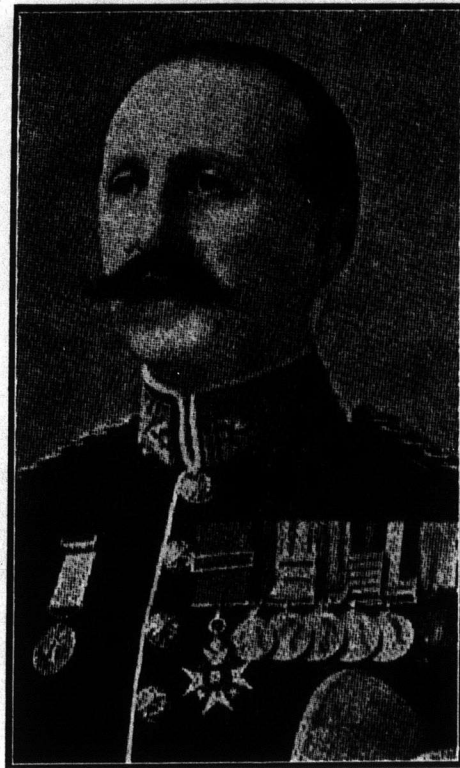




German troops leaving Berlin for the front.

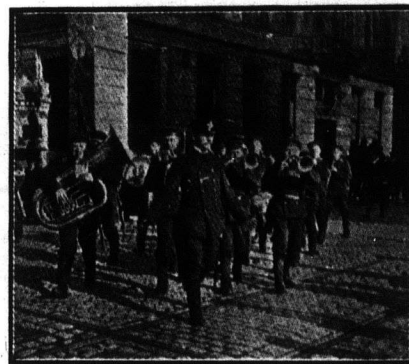
French troops pulling down German frontier mark. This frontier post, bearing the Black Eagle of Germany, stood in the Vosges across which the French advanced.

A German marine band in Antwerp.



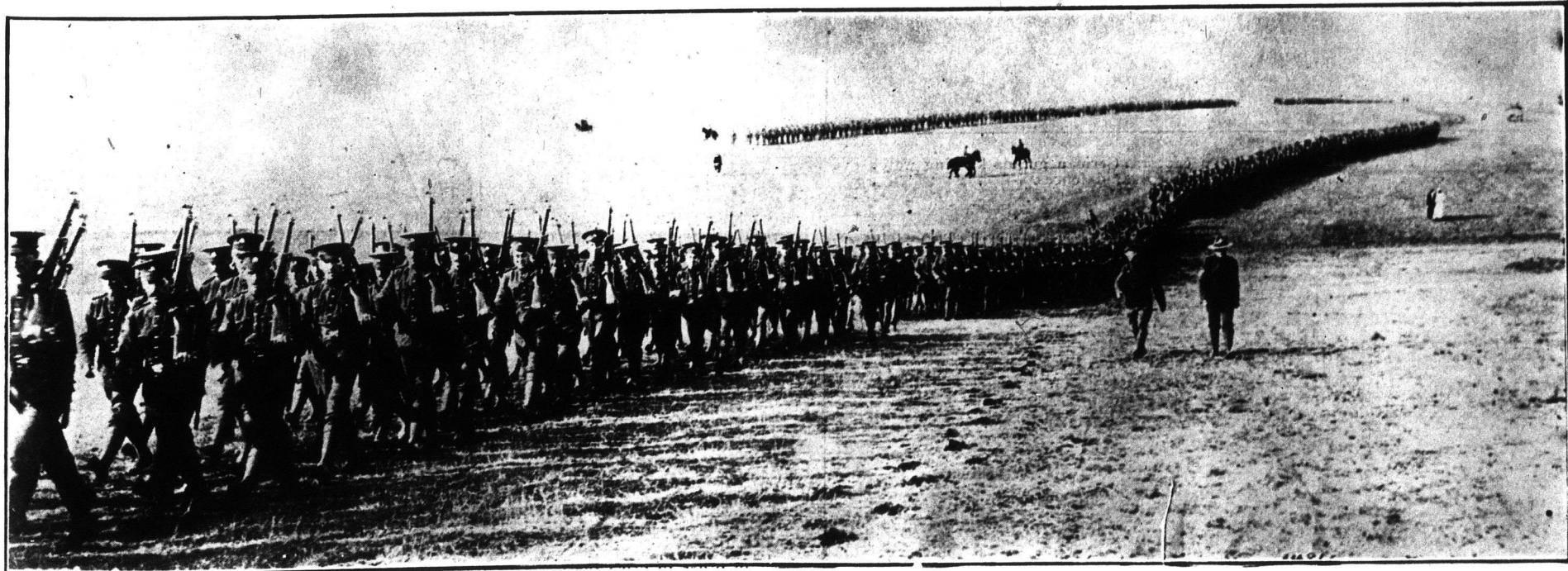
