

A Pathetic Specials.

Headquarters of the Third Japanese Army at Port Arthur, Jan. 6, via Kinkow and Tientsin, Jan. 10.—
Five thousand men of the Russian garrison at Port Arthur to-day were marched from Yahutsui to Chang Ling Tzu, and the other detachments followed soon after. Each detachment was accompanied by six loaded transport carts. The Russians during the night will be taken on special trains or open trucks to Dalny, and they will immediately embark for Japan.

The long procession of remnants of the gallant Russian garrison was a pathetic spectacle. The first arrivals at Chanlingtzu were four droskies, drawn by sorry looking horses. They contained the staff officers who had refused to give their parole. All wore their swords, as they were allowed to de under the terms of the capitulation compact.

A few minutes later the first detachment arrived. The regimental officers marched with their men, their heads howed and their faces seamed with lines, showing the result of the mental and physical strain they had A Pathetic Spectacle.

The prisoners were treated with the greatest respect and kindness, though they were regarded with much natural curiosity. The soldiers were given food, cigurettes and beer and the Japanese soldiers voluntarily carried the effects of the prisoners when they were avercome by fatigue.

Original Garrison.

Tokio, Jan. 10.—In well informed circles it is estimated that the original garrison of Port Arthur numbered about 38,000 to 40,000 men, including sailors. The killed, those who died of sickness, and the missing, are placed at over 10,000.

JAPS REGRET IT.

Explain Why a British Cruiser's Aid Was Declined. Tokio, Jan. 10.—The Navy Department announces that it regrets the misunderstanding in the case of the British cruiser Andromeda, which recently sailed from Wei-Hai-Wei for Port Arthur with hospital stores and surgeons to assist the sick and wounded, and was not permitted to land.

The department says the commander at Port Arthur refused the aid offered by the Andromeda owing to the fact that he had not received instructions. The British authorities at Wei-Hai-Wei were late in notifying Sir Claude MacDonald, the British minister at Tokio, of the cruiser's mission.
