CAN THIS BE TRUE

A blood curdling story of cruelty to animals is reported from Chatham Township and should be investigated immediately.

It is claimed that a Jew of this city was coming into the city with a load of old iron which he had gathered in the country. His horse, a well bred grey mare, got tired out pulling the heavy load through the heavy sand in the Township and the wagon got stuck in the sand on the corner of the third concession and the Prince Albert Road.

The man proceeded to beat the horse until he fell down exhausted and disabled. The man procured another horse and left the disabled one at the side of the road, where it has remained without moving, but still alive, ever since. Yesterday it was lying on the road and evidently in much pain, but unable to help itself.

The neighbors have taken the matter up and the faithless owner of the horse will, in all probability, be prosecuted.

The June sittings of the County Court opened yesterday afternoon at half past one o'clock before Judge Bell at the Court House.

CRIMINAL CASES.

The King vs. James Haskill, indictment against.

King vs. Joseph Jubenville, attempting to shoot.

King vs. Hugh Knight, criminal assault.

King vs. James Duddy, theft.

King vs. C. Moore, perjury.

King vs. Wm. Wood, criminal assault, two charges.

King vs. Joseph Hamilton, perjury.

Mr. Jordan was sworn in as foreman of the grand jury and Judge Bell addressed them.

He reviewed the docket, explaining the different charges and their duty in the several matters which will come up before them.

"The list of criminal cases," said he, "is very much larger than usual and much larger than it should be. This arises not because there is more crime, but at the last sittings of the Court a number of the cases were laid over."

"It is customary for the grand jury to visit the different public buildings and report on their condition. I would also ask you to consider your bills immediately."

A couple of naturalization papers were taken out.

Crown Attorney H. D. Smith reported to the Judge that John Irwin had left the country. He is wanted on a charge of theft and left behind him \$200 in bail. Steps will be taken to procure the money.

The June sessions of the County Court are still in progress and will be on at the court house for some days.

The grand jury have not yet finished their work. True bills were brought in yesterday in the cases of King vs. Joseph Jubenville; King vs. Hugh Knight; King vs. Jas. Haskill and King vs. Logan. It is expected that more reports will be given by the grand jury to-day.

In the above cases Jubenville is charged with attempting to shoot; Knight is charged with carnally knowing a girl under 16 years of age; Haskill is charged with indecent assault, while Logan will have to answer to two charges of destroying public property.

The case of King vs. Haskill was commenced yesterday afternoon. He is charged with assaulting a girl named Graham in Raleigh. The case for the prosecution occupied the attention of the Court all day yesterday and was concluded at noon to-day.
