WORST MOVE EVER MADE BY THE Y. M. C. A.

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POPE IMPROVES BUT IS STILL VERY WEAK

Special Prayers in All the Churches of Rome for the Next Three Days—Relapse of Influenza is Cause of Illness.

ROME, April 9.—The condition of the Pope was much improved to-day. Professor Marchiafava the Vatican physician, visited the Pontiff for over an hour this morning and found his fever greatly reduced.

Cardinal Pompili, who was made the new vicar-general only a few days ago, issued orders to-day for special prayers for the Pope, in all the churches of Rome during the next three days.

Prof. Ettore Marchiafava's examination of the Pope this morning was of a most minute character. He declared afterward that there was a noticeable improvement in the Pontiff's general condition...

Some 3,000 pilgrims gathered in the course of the morning on the Piazza Di San Pietro in front of the Vatican, under the open window of the Pope's apartment and prayed for his recovery.

A terrific thunderstorm accompanied by a heavy fall of hail greatly disturbed the Pope this morning. His nervous system has become most sensitive since the beginning of his illness.

Prof. Ettore Marchiafava, the Pope's physician assured the press this morning that His Holiness is suffering only from a relapse of influenza, which like all relapses is causing a certain amount of anxiety...

The medical reports which have been spread as to the Pope being affected with nephritis or inflammation of the kidneys, are said the professor, absolutely unfounded.

What the Pontiff needs above all, is rest, continued the eminent physician, and the 24 hours he has spent in bed completely isolated from any affairs, has already produced satisfactory effect.

All the symptoms of a dangerous character which have been mentioned in authorized reports are either imaginary or grossly exaggerated, some of them being quite the reverse of the present condition of the Pontiff which excludes any danger unless complications should intervene.

While official reports state that the improvement in the condition of the Pope continues, it is reported in other quarters that the Pontiff is suffering from difficulty of respiration, thirst and prostration.

Everything is being prepared at the Vatican to give the Pope a long period of rest and all pilgrimages have been suspended during this month.

Several Cardinals, including Rampolla, Vives Y Tuto De Lai, Martinielli, Falconio, Bisleti, and Agliardi called personally at the Vatican this morning to inquire about the Pope's health.

They desired to see the patient, but were not allowed to do so as the instructions of the doctors were imperative that the Pope was to receive no visitors.

Some of the callers were received by Cardinal Merry Del Val, Papal Secretary of State, others by Mgr. Ramussi and the rest by Mgr. Canali, the substitute Secretary of State.
