Result of Lord Derby's Campaign Just Div. Announced Shows That Only About Two-Thirds of Available Men Registered Their Names.

London, January 4, 11 a m.— Lord Derby's recruiting figures for the period between October 23 and December 15, show that 1, 150,000 unmarried men and 1,679,-263 married men presented them-

"Of 5,11,441 men of military age in the United Kingdom only 2,829,261 enlisted during the Lord Derby recruiting campaign it was anounced to-day. When the Derby campaign was inaugurated it was understood that if recruits came forward in sufficient force the government would decide defining EDUCATION the government would decide definitely against conscription. A special appeal was made to unmarried men to enlist.

"The government made public these figures to-day to show why it was found necessary to adopt some form of conscription. It was pointed out that proportionately far more married men than single men answered the call to the colors.
