## BELGIANS ARE SENT BACK HOME

Lawrason of Lynden.

Deported Workmen Returned to Germany in a **Dying Condition** 

Several car loads of deported Bel gian workmen have been returned from German labor camps to Brussels. These men, owing to the treatment they received in Germany, have been sent home to die. Even in Belgium, nothing more pitiful was ever seen than the homecoming of these slaves, released because they were no longer serviceable, too weak to fetch and carry for their German masters. Many of them had to be lifted from the cattle trucks in which they arrived.

It appears that they were mobilized at Soltau Camp, Germany. They were huddled into cattle trucks, which were switched on to a goods train, destined to stop at every sta-tion en route to Brussels, and giving ight-of-way to every other train on the line. Ordinarily the journey takes six hours, but these sick men, travelling under conditions indisribably cruel, were three nights and three days in reaching their destin-

Periodically they were given a little bread and water, and one morning a decoction of boiled acorns. Some died every day, and two of the men became insane. They

man labor camps are beyond the help of Canadians, except of those freedom. But for their mothers, wives, and children, we can do much. They are threatened by starvation more relentlessly today then. vation more relentlessly today than vation more rejentlessly today than ever. We can lift that peril from their shoulders. The Relief Commission in Belgium, consisting of 4,000 committees officered by the best citizens in the country, is able to undertake the work of distribution as effectively as ever though no longer.
