
HER DAUGHTER WAS SAVED FROM OPERATION

BALLIN SAYS TERMS ARE MILD.

By Courier Leased Wire London, Nov. 21.—(British wireless service).—The late Albert Ballin, director-general of Hamburg, American Steamship Company, in discussing the indicated armistice terms to be given to Germany in a letter to the editor of the National Zeitung of Berlin shortly before his death, according to a telegram from Zurich, said: "The indicated military, economic and political conditions of the Entente are much more moderate than might have been expected from our situation. We need only think what our terms would have been had we been the victors."

"We would have demanded the occupation of Paris and London. We would have dictated peace at Buckingham Palace and annexed the entire continent from the Ural Mountains to the Bay of Biscay."
