LATEST OUTSIDE NEWS

Twenty-nine people were killed in a wreck on the Reading railroad, near Reading, Pa., on May 12.

J. S. Sherman, of New York, is said to be slated for speaker of the house of congress in place of Reed.

The death of the venerable Justice Field, of the United States supreme court, is announced by the last paper in.

Ex-President Grover Cleveland was reported to be dead on May 15, but it proved to be without foundation.

The students of Princeton college would not allow a parade of Pawnee Bill's wild west show and a fatal riot resulted.

Schaeffer defeated Blosson in a game of billiards for \$500 a side at New York on May 15. The final score was 600 to 418.

Chester Jessup, aged 17 years, was handled so roughly by buyers of the high school at Kalamazoo, Mich., that he died.

Queen Victoria visited the Kensington palace on May 15 and saw the apartments she occupied while a girl. She was enthusiastically received.

State of Washington weather has been such so far this year as to call out comparisons with the memorable "year without a summer," 30 years ago.

Herr Maximilian Harden, a Berlin editor, has been sentenced to prison for a term of six months for lese majeste. He called Emperor William "a poodle prince."

Russia has demanded from China a concession for connecting Peking with the Russian railroad system. Japan, England and Germany show much uneasiness over the move.

President McKinley has prepared plans for a swing around the circle this summer. He will go to the coast by way of the northern states and return home by way of the south.

The English soldiers at Taipeh, China, had a pitched battle with the natives on April 17. The loss to the Chinese could not be learned, as the dead and wounded were carried away.

Emperor William, of Germany, is said to have a scheme to place a German king on Chinese soil. Prince Henry, his brother, is said to have been selected, and the province of Shantung will be his kingdom.

Rev. Dr. Charles A. Briggs, who was suspended from the Presbyterian assembly in America for heresy, has been ordained a priest of the Episcopal church, the ceremonies occurring in New York.

The United States soldiers in Drea and Wrangle are to be given a touch of service in the Philippines, an order having been issued to that effect. They will be succeeded by members of the Twenty-fourth regiment, colored.

Rev. S. Hall, Rev. M. E. Koonce, Rev. J. W. Kirk and Rev. M. Corser have been assigned to missionary work among the American miners in Alaska and will this summer establish Presbyterian churches at Circle City and Minook.

Admiral Dewey is to return home soon, and elaborate preparations are being made to welcome him, both by his countrymen and by the navies of the world. New York city alone has appropriated \$150,000 for the reception there.

Lawrence Roach and wife, colored people, of Atlanta, Georgia, wrapped their four little children in paper saturated with oil and ignited it. One of them had the flesh burned from her legs in several places. They were arrested and may be lynched.

The New Capias Ordinance. The first arrest under the new capias ordinance passed by the Yukon Council was made on Saturday, when Patrick Murphy was arrested at the instance of R. C. Dodge, who appeared before Judge Dugas on that day and made affidavit that Murphy owed him \$160 on a promissory note and that plaintiff had reason to believe that he was about to leave the Yukon territory with the express object of defrauding his creditors in general and the plaintiff in particular.

It would seem that no country needs such a law more than this, and its passage was very opportune.
