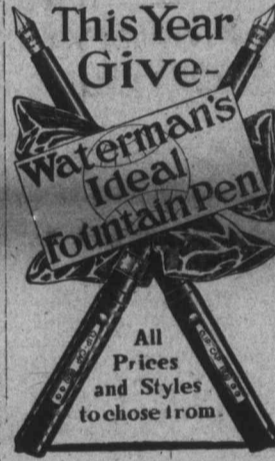
Mr. R. U. Parker, General Passenger Agent D. A. R. is in Boston and New York on business.
