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DEATH OF JUDGE BORDEN.

Judge R. A. Borden died at Moncton, March 26th.

The late Robert Allison Borden was born Feb. 3rd, 1846, at Avonport N. S. He was the son of the late George Newton Borden and Miriam Crane Borden, daughter of the late Col. Crane. He was a direct descendant of Perry Borden, the founder of the Borden family in Nova Scotia. The late Judge Borden was a second cousin of the Rt. Hon. Sir Robert L. Borden, Prime Minister of Canada, and also of the late Sir Frederick Borden. His early

education was received at Acadia Villa Seminary under the principalship of Dr. Patterson. He afterwards entered Mt. Allison University, graduating from that institution in 1866. He entered the law offices of Wetmore and Barker in St John where he studied three years, being admitted to the bar in 1869.

He entered upon the practice of his profession in Moncton and was associated first with the late C. A. Holstead, afterwards with Harvey Atkinson and the late C. E. A. Synmonds. On March 2nd, 1912, he was appointed County Court Judge for Westmorland and Kent Counties in the place of W. W. Wells, resigned. This honored position on the judiciary he held until his death. The deceased was a member of Keith Lodge A. F. & A. M. and also of the I. O. F.

During the many years that he practised his profession in the city the late Judge Borden won the general esteem and respect of citizens. He ably performed the duties of his office as County Court Judge, and his death will be the cause of widespread regret.

Judge Borden is survived by his widow, who was formerly Miss Smith, of Sussex, and one daughter, Miss Lila Borden, residing at home. The late Judge Borden is also survived by his brother, Rev. Dr. B. C. Borden, President of Mount Allison University; and one sister, Mrs. R. S. Smith, of Somerville, Mass. Mrs. Harris, wife of Lieut.-Col. Leonard Harris, who recently returned from England, is a niece of Mrs. Borden.

The late Mrs. J. W. S. Black, of Sackville, formerly Miss Sadie Borden, was a daughter of the late Judge Borden, and her son, Master Robert Snowball Black, known as "Bobbie", a grandson, is now attending school at Rothesay.

ENTERTAINED MEMBERS OF SON'S BATTERY.

W. C. Archibald, landscape architect of Wolfville (N. S.), is in the city. He has a son in the 5th Battery in France. A number of soldiers attached to this battery returned home wounded a few days ago and Mr. Archibald took the opportunity presented to make them his guests at a social held at the home of Miss Brand, 7 Dorchester St. By so doing he desired to show his personal appreciation and gratitude for their many deeds of valor in battles at Moquet Farm, Sugar refinery, at Courcelette and Paschendale. Gunner Archibald was a graduate of Acadia University in Wolfville N. S. and was a medical student at McGill University when he enlisted and crossed overseas.

Mr. Archibald gave an eloquent address to the assemblage in which he pointed out that the gathering was for two purposes, to honor the 5th Battery overseas and the wounded men who have returned after upholding the traditions of their forefathers by deeds of valor on the blood-stained fields of France. He told how the war had deeply stirred both the principles of right and defence of our loved ones. He pointed out that it was not what men said but what they did that counts. In conclusion, Mr. Archibald gave a sketch of the life of his son and told of his youthful hobbies as a small boy and later his life as a student. His remarks called forth hearty applause.

Address were given by a number of the returned officers and men and also by F. J. Dykeman, whose son recently returned from overseas. Musical numbers were rendered after which a bounteous repast was served. — St. John Telegraph.
