Among other things he showed the rapid increase in the dairy industry. In 1871 there were but 351 cheese factories, while in 1881 the number had increased to 709; in 1891 to 1556, 1898 to 2556. In 1894, we made 32,000 packages of creamery butter, which increased in 1895 to 66,000; in 1896 to 157,000 and in 1898 to 250,000; and in 1898 to 300 up to date.
