TUBERCULAR GERMS IN ALL OUR LUNGS

Dr. Bryce Confirms a Statement That Everyone Has Consumption Germs

Toronto News. Consumption is looked upon as fatal affliction, and those who have it are told to abandon hope, because the disease will have but one ending It will come as a shock to know that physicians agree upon the statement that nearly every person that walks the streets has in his or her system

the bacilli of the dreaded "white plague."

Dr. Adolf Hoff, a continental physician has recently conducted a series of experiments at Vienna, Austria, with what he claims to be a new specific for consumption, and the reports made public indicate that a ertain measure of success has been obtained. Any hope of a permanent cure for this disease is considered with the greatest attention, because of the prevalence of consumption and the helpless condition of its victims who are doomed to a death that is all the more dreadful, because of its tardy coming. The formula of Dr. Hoff's specific contains a number of by doctors in this country, with but indifferent success. At the best, an existence that can be none too sweet

is given a brief respite.
"I haven't heard of this new discov ery," said Dr. Bryce, of the Provin-cial Board of Health, when spoken to. "New treatments are being pubto. "New treatments are being published every short while, and you will probably have another to print in your to-morrow's paper."

your to-morrow's paper."

A New York physician, who occupies an important position in one of the large hospitals there, was spoken to in regard to the same matter the other day, and in reply he said: "All the autopsies that have come under my observation of persons who have died from other diseases than consumption, or from injuries received in accidents, two-thirds of the victims have shown the unmistakable evidences of consumption, though they may not have exhibited any symptoms during life. But in each case the bacilli were found in their lungs."

Dr. Bryce was asked if he held sim ilar views.
"Yes," he replied, "I have no doubt that all of us are more or less affected. Those having the strongest systems throw off the germs or counteract their work; while the consumption undermines the constitutions of the weaker, who, in the course of time succumb. One thing I have notime succumb. One thing I have noticed in studying consumption is that about 80 per cent. of the victims of the disease belong to the artisan and poorer classes. Only a fifth of the total deaths occur among the rich or those who are enabled to obtain strengthening foods all the time, and who are not exposed.

"I have no doubt that the disease germs would be found in all of our lungs, for we are continually exposed to contagion."
