



Bangor Horsemen Located At Woodstock's Parlor Track With His Stable of Horses

About Thirty Horses Are Now in Training at the Island Track—
Harry Nevers Big Stable at Houlton—St. John's
Decision to Have a Fair.

Woodstock, N. B., April 27.—(Pope)
D. McKinnon, the well known Bangor,
Me., horseman, has joined the training
colony at the parlor track at the Fair
grounds on the island and there are
now almost thirty horses located there
with chances of a good many more
being on hand before the racing starts.

Mr. McKinnon has three horses in
his stable so far while J. A. DeWitt,
of Presque Isle, Me., has five head in
his stable, too. W. F. ... has
two and R. E. Hamilton, H. M. Mar-
tell, C. T. Black, Earle Avery and A.
A. Poole each have one horse they are
fitting.

Canada's Hockey Victory In the Olympic Series

The Winnipeg Falcons
Defeated the Swedish
Team by 12 to 1

EASY VICTORY
FOR CANADIANS

Yankees Now Likely to
Win Second Honors
at Antwerp.

(By Canadian Associated Press.)
Antwerp, April 27.—The Falcons of
Winnipeg, who last night defeated the
Swedish Olympic hockey team by a
score of 12 to 1, gained an easy
victory over their opponents by the
masterly style in which they played.
They were considered unbeat-
able. The attacks of Halderson, Frederick-
son and Goodman were superb and
while the Swedish defense was coun-
ageous they were able to offer only a
weak resistance to the lightning
dashes of the victors.

The Canadian Victory.
Antwerp, April 26.—The Falcons of
Winnipeg tonight defeated the Swed-
ish Olympic hockey team by a score
of 12 to 1, winning the Olympic cham-
pionship.

In the figure skating pairs, Finland
won first place, Norway second, Eng-
land third, and the United States
fourth.

The Swedish hockey team, which
won from Belgium in the preliminary
contest, was composed of star skaters
who lacked, however, the long and
arduous training in the game that
would fit them to cope with a first
class team. The Swedes played desper-
ately from first to last, working
heroically to score, and despite the
fact that they were hopelessly out-
classed their stubborn defensive work
kept the tally away below what the
balance of play indicated.

Under the Olympic rules all teams
directly beaten by the champion team
must compete for second place. Thus
the American, Czechoslovak and
Swedish teams will now play off.

Announced in Parliament.

Ottawa, April 26.—In the middle of
a warm debate in the Commons to-
night, the House then being in sup-
ply, Dr. M. Blake (North West-
pep), rose and asked permission to
speak on a matter of interest. The
"Winnipeg Falcons have won the in-
ternational hockey championship in
Antwerp, 12 to 1," he said, and mem-

Sharkey and Friedman To Meet at Boston Tonight In Important 12 Round Bout

Jimmy Wilde to Run His American Earnings Up to \$65,000 by
Bout at Lawrence, Mass., on Saturday—Police Stop
Mike O'Dowd's Bout at Philadelphia.

Boston, April 27.—Bantamweight
Champion Pete Herman will await
with more than passing interest the
result of the bout between Jack Shar-
key, of New York, and Abe Friedman,
of Boston, who will meet in a 12-
round bout to a decision tonight, at
Mechanics' Hall, under the direction
of the Army A. A. The winner will
stand out prominently as one of the
most formidable contenders for Her-
man's title.

Realizing that in Friedman he will
meet no sinecure, Sharkey arrived in
Boston last Thursday to complete his
training. He knows that he must be
in his best physical condition if he is
to avoid defeat. The contest will be for
a decision. Were it a no-decision affair
there would not be as much at stake,
but a reverse coming at this time in
his career would upset his plans for
the future.

Jimmy Wilde's Next Bout.
British Flyweight Champion Jimmy
Wilde will enter his ninth contest
since arriving in this country when
he steps into the ring at the Cuddy
Brothers Arena, Lawrence, on Sat-
urday afternoon, to box Bobby Dyson,
of New Bedford, in a 12-round bout. The
occasion will enlarge Wilde's earnings
from the rings in this country to near-
ly \$65,000.

His record here follows: Jack
Sharkey, last, received \$11,000; Babe
Asher, won, \$5,000; Mike Ertle, won,
by a knockout, \$5,000; Mike Russell,
won by a knockout, \$5,000; Patsy
Bogach, won, \$4,500; Frankie Mason,
won, \$10,750; Zulu Kid, won, \$5,000;
Battling Murray, won, \$5,000. For meet-
ing Dyson he will receive at least \$10,-
000 and possibly more, as the interest
in the meeting is greater than in any
fight held in the Lawrence open-air
arena.
