None of the French had fired down the hole before I started to jump down. I had not a gun in my hand, I didn't see one in the hands of any Frenchman. No one from behind me could have fired at me because I was in the hole. I did not throw anything to the trap or anywhere while I was in the loft. I had neither stick, stone nor gun in my hand. I jumped down trap. I know it. Sewell. I saw a lot of nets hanging up in loft, about 4 feet from the floor. I saw a net hanging from the ceiling. As I fell, I saw a net hanging down, had nothing to do with it. When I jumped down, I had nothing

in my hands. When I jumped down about 10 men jumped on me and seized me and one struck me over the head with the butt of a gun. Struck me hard; about a week I couldn't get out of my eye. (Prosecution objected to last portion of the answer, and it is shut out subject to Mr. Thomson's objection.) After they took me in the house they took me out doors into a little garden as far as I could see, and two men came up with a pistol each side of the head, spitting it on both sides. I did not try to strike them; I didn't try to get away from them; I fell down on the ground. When I came to I got up, all covered with blood. I didn't know whether I got up myself or not. I didn't know whether they helped me. They took me to Young's.

Was struck with 2 pistols. (Shows scar to jury.) Dr. Bishop attended me in jail for those wounds. Had nothing on his hands when struck.

house?" Is it true that you ate there the night meat, bread, butter, sugar, tea, beer and biscuits. Objected to and shut out.

(Same question put as to other witnesses as to whether Frenchmen assembled for purposes of plotting the assassination of the president or to prevent the arrest of any person.)

Did not know people were met for any such purpose. When I jumped down trap considered my life in danger. While firing was going on the lives of the French people were in danger. Have on same vest now as I had on that night. These marks of blood on it from my head. (Shows stains on vest between shoulders.)

Cross-examined by Kerr:—Was at Brackley's office 15th. Was not at 29th. Was at Albert's on the night of 20th. Beside

myself. Albert, Agapie Albert, Xavier, Agapie Albert, were there. I saw Jos. Chaisson there. Agapie's wife and Gideon's wife played cards there. Children were there. Xavier and I stopped up all night. Women went to bed. When I went away at sunrise didn't see any guns. Telephone was there. I saw a telephone. I remained there only 3 or 4 minutes. Can't say what time John Louis Frigeau came; don't know how long he was there. Frigeau may have been there but no knowledge of having seen him. When Telephone Brigade came back, I saw Joseph Chaisson and he came back again. (Names number others he saw there.) Guns produced. Cannot point out the guns I put in the loot, out of the children's way. Identifies a gun which he says is his father's.) Only saw 2 guns

put in the loft were loaded. My gun may have been loaded. I didn't load it that day. Don't know who took the powder horn there didn't see it; didn't see the shot in the bottle. I saw Agapit, Sina, Agapit, Prudent and Bernard, Albert, ... Don't know. Parisee, Sina, Poulin, Agapit Albert. After they were up, they all disappeared but Agapit; they all hid out of my sight. Don't know where they hid. Don't know what guns were in the loft. Don't tell whether the guns were to shoot Young. My gun was not to shoot any one that came along. When constables came I was leaning on pile of boards N. side of loft. I hear Blackhall asking for Parisee. Didn't know Parisee was in the room of constable, only heard Blackhall say 3 or 4 words. I spoke these words in about the space of

minute. Didn't know from who was said that they came to make arrests. I heard Charles Parlane named, but didn't hear any other names. Didn't know if they were cops. Didn't know where men in the loft were excepting Agapit Albert. I didn't fire a gun. Left Albert's in the morning at sunrise didn't see any children there. Saw I child at noon. Several no children in the house. Just a woman and a child. Didn't know if the wife wasn't there. Didn't know Blackhall Cable, Gammon or Ramsay were constables. The guns were there, I don't know for what purpose. I heard a man cry out pretty loud. Didn't know if he was a constable. Good deal of noise, don't know whether the man saw the Englishman lying on floor, didn't know whether he was dead. I had no doubt whether he was dead or alive. I didn't doubt
