TRIBUTE TO I. C. R.

Visitor writes on magnificent Scenery and Comfortable Travelling in N. B.

By way of introduction to a story of salmon fishing in Northern New Brunswick and on the other side of the Quebec border, and of the number of Americans who visit this province annually to spend a vacation along the banks of the Restigouche, Miramichi, Nepisiguit and their tributaries, a writer in the sporting pages of the (New Jersey) Evening News paints a pretty picture of Campbellton and pays a notable tribute to the Intercolonial Railway.

Three weeks he writes after Alton B. Parker had been nominated for the Presidency by the Democratic national convention at St. Louis, in July 1904, I stepped off the Ocean Limited at the little town of Campbellton, in Northern New Brunswick, Canada.

The 5,000 or so inhabitants of Campbellton were still asleep, for it was but two hours after dawn. The place was a picture in the purple of the morning. It nestled between mountains on either side of the Bay Chaleur to which Jacques Cartier gave the name hundreds of years ago and which rolled away to the sea, leaving the feet of Campbellton, while the lordly river Restigouche stretched its proud length in the opposite direction.

The little cottages of the fishermen and farmers on the opposite shore of the bay looked like so many spook houses in their deep quietness. Presently the breeze wafted across the water, the music

of the bell tolling in a Franciscan monastery on a hillside, no doubt calling the monks to an early mass. It is only when you get far from the noises of a great city with its eternal buzz and frequent clanging, that you find surroundings like this. The forests about you are primeval.

The Ocean Limited stopped there long enough to allow the locomotive to have its tank filled with water. While it was blowing and snorting a Jerseyman and two New Yorkers came hustling up the platform laden with fishing tackle and boarded a car.

The Ocean Limited is the high sounding name of the crack train on the Intercolonial Railroad, owned by the Canadian Government and operated by it between Montreal and Halifax—from almost the centre of the continent to the Atlantic sea board. The Intercolonial skirts the southern shore of the majestic St. Lawrence for miles and miles. It then makes a semi-circle through the peninsula of Gaspe, down through the Matapedia Valley; one of the most famous fishing grounds in the world, and where, at this time of year, the sportsman in his glory, for salmon and trout literally run to the hook in the streams of the beautiful valley. The American, who is a stranger to Canada, will find any misgivings about uncomfortable modes of travel on the other side of the forty-ninth parallel dispelled when he boards the Ocean Limited. He will encounter every comfort on this train that he did not possess going to Montreal from an American city.

The climax of his surprise will be reached when, after eating in the dining car—a course dinner that seems remarkably fresh, the porter will hand him a bill—seventy-five cents. As we seem to have a tacit agreement in our part of the world that ten per cent is an all sufficient gratuity, the porter will be amply satisfied with a tip of a dime.

The writer then goes on to tell of the resorts of the gamey salmon and of the yearly influx of sportsmen to the New Brunswick and Quebec fishing grounds.

NEW BABBIT METAL

Its Durable and Wearing Qualities are Attracting Attention.

Moncton may, in the near future, become the location of a large industry, that of manufacturing the metal invented by Mr. Joseph Stratton, the well-known J. C. K. baggage master.

The metal, which is attracting the attention of many large corporations is daily demonstrating its wearing qualities and is proving to be a splendid success. The invention is attracting the attention of several large upper Province capitalists, and already Mr. Stratton has had many excellent offers for the formation of a company to manufacture the product. Inducements have been held out to him to secure his patent and enter a company, and local capitalists are also interesting themselves in the matter. The result may be that a company will be formed in this city, a plant established and the metal manufactured.

The metal, which was invented by Mr. Stratton, has proven a success in every particular, especially so in wearing and saving qualities.

Its durability has been particularly proven in connection with railway journal bearings. An ordinary brass "bush" as the journal bearing is called, wears for about 15,000 miles and then the "end-wear" renders it unfit for further use until refilled. The process of refilling, besides being a highly expensive and difficult procedure, has been very unsatisfactory with the metals formerly used. Mr. Stratton's "Excelsior Babbit" has, however, shown great durability. An old "bush" refilled with his metal, travelled 90,000 miles, six times as far as the old "bush," and was then pronounced by the car inspectors to be in condition for several months more travelling. This was on a heavy I. C. R. car and the C. P. R. and the G. T. R. have submitted equally as satisfactory reports.

In machine shops too the metal has given every satisfaction. Mr. S. A. Peters, Mechanical Superintendent of the R. F. and M. Co. here, says the metal has given every satisfaction.

Mr. Peters recommends the metal for heavy or light running machinery and cited instances where when other metals had worn only four months, "Excelsior Babbit" had worn for a year and still in good working order.

A CARIBOU HUNTING STORY.

Animal was Killed by Electricity.

Sydney Post: Mr. J. C. Strang, a New York sportsman, was a passenger to North Sydney last week by the steamer Bruce from Newfoundland, where he had been spending twelve weeks camping and fishing at the head of Deer Lake, one of the famous waterways in the interior, about one hundred and twenty-five miles from Port-aux-Basques. Mr. Strang had in his possession a magnificent caribou head of twenty-four points, which must have belonged at one time to a veritable monarch of the forest. As this is the close season of the year for shooting these animals, and a twenty-four point set of antlers not being the easiest article to smuggle aboard ship, a story was apparently behind the curtain. When asked regarding his prize, Mr. Strang gave the following:

"We had been camping, myself and guide, at the head of Deer Lake, directly in the path the caribou trod in their yearly migrations from north to south, and each night dozens of these animals, and sometimes a herd of a hundred or more, would enter the narrow strip of water at the head of the lake and swim across to the other side. One could almost imagine they were tame and turned loose in some park so little did they fear molestation. On the night of the 30th of August, and all through that day, a most terrific storm of thunder and lightning, accompanied by wind of hurricane force, raged over the interior section of the country, which we were occupying, uprooting the largest trees and throwing them about in all directions. The guide and myself were sitting at the lee of our shelter on the outside, when suddenly there was a crash in the bushes to the left of us, and a magnificent stag caribou bounded into the clearing not twenty feet from where we sat. With head high in the air and nostrils dilated, it was evident he scent d danger. Another peal of thunder rent the air, followed by a flash of lurid lightning. In the centre of the shaft stood the deer apparently petrified by his surroundings. After the storm cleared up next morning we found the caribou dead in the spot where we had seen him on the previous evening. Wrapped tightly around the upper prongs of his antlers were a piece of telegraph wire about ten feet long. The wire had acted as a conductor and the animal was electrocuted.

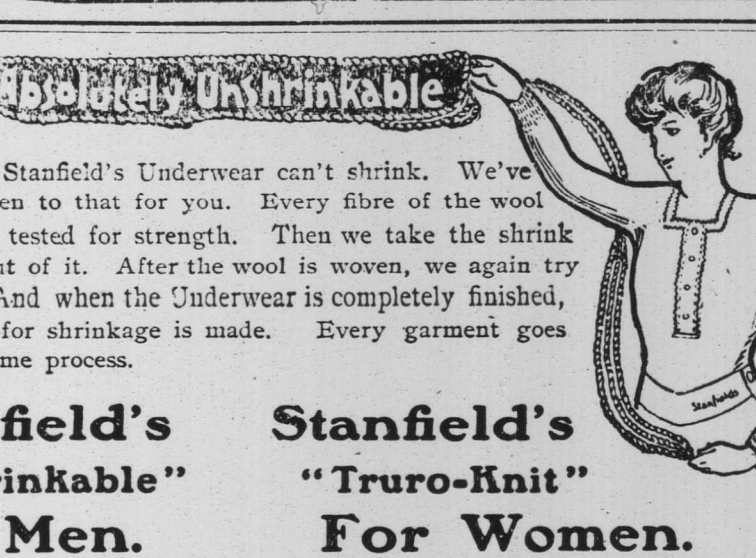
