Butter And Canned Foods Come Under Strict Regulation

canned foods will be provided in legislation to be submitted to parliament by the Minister of Agriculture. The legis'ation will prevent the use of oils as an adulterant in butter and forbid the keeping of foreign fats, which might be used for adulterating purposes, on the premises of any perspns engaged in 'the manufacture of butter. Inspectors will also be authorized to seize illegal dairy products
