DAIRY COOPERATION.

And What It is Doing for the Cheese

and Butter Interests of Canada.

Speaking at Brockville, Ont., recently,

Prof. Robertson, of Ottawa, among other

things proceeded to lay down certain prin-

ciples which were applicable to the dairy

business, as carried on by the man engaged

in it, and assisted by the government. He

declared himself a believer in the prin-

ciple of co-operation to its very wide

legitimate scope. Co-operation was par-

ticularly needful in new sections, and in

starting a new business. When the clear-

ing of this country first began there was

need for co-operation in building; and

logging bees, and other bees, or gather-

ings, were common, as when men en-

deavored to help each other, as being the

only means of making the first steps of
