I managed to get out that night and consulted my wife, and then I decided to do it "On three occasions I took notes to Dr. Cantlie, and carried back a few words of reply written on a visiting card Dr. Cantlie was in communication with the Foreign Office, and I told Sun Yat Sen that it would be many days before he was free." As soon as the matter came to the ears of the Foreign Office, Lord Salisbury, who was then Prime Minister and Secretary for Foreign Affairs sent for Sir Halliday Macartney. Sir Halliday pleaded the doctrine of "extraterritoriality" - that is, the King's writ does not run in a Foreign Embassy. Lord Salisbury made short work of this. In effect he said, " have nothing to do with the Chinese Legation, but you are a British subject, and if you don't release this man it will be worse for you." This threat was effective. Two men were sen from Scotland Yard to the Legation and Sir Halliday Macartney was re quired to deliver the prisoner. He handed the key of the room to one of the detectives and showed them


