Pretty and Attractive Punch Work

All punch work must be done i loops, and care should be taken that the threads lie straight and that the hoons fit snug.

Starting at the left-hand side, fas en your thread securely on the un der side of the linen, and bring th needle up through the first dot of the second row of work connects the sec and and third rows of dots, and i worked just the same. When the en tire space is worked in this direction turn the work and take the stitche right angles to those already work d, thus forming the four sides ach small square. This complete the punch work stitch, but one should ractice first on some white material as it is a very easy matter to draw the stitches unevenly, and this will produce a puckered effect outside of he punch work. A little wrinkle can scarcely be avoided, owing to the ma ure of the work. The tighter th stitches are drawn the more open an acy the result. When one has mas ered this stitch, many and beautift re the pieces on which it may h sed.-Practical Needlework, in Wo nan's World for February.


